IRISH MEMBERS ARE RESERVED

They Will Not Announce a Definite Policy

Until After Dublin Meeting April 14. John Redmond is Inclined to Praise Land Bills Provisions.

LONDON, March 26.—This morning's papers in their editorial comments on yesterday's proceedings in the House of Commons, and the Irish land bill, universally compliment Mr. Wyndham, but they hesitate to express a definite opinion on such a complex measure without having fuller acquaintance of it, on the ground that its success depends wholly on the nature and working of the complicated financial details. However, all the newspapers agree that, although the bill will place a burden on the British taxpayer, it will be well worth the money if the objects are attained.

The Times says: "If the Irish landlords and tenants consider that Mr. Wyndham's plan satisfies to a reasonable extent the expectations that were aroused a few months ago, we do not believe the people of the United Kingdom will show a niggardly spirit in giving the financial aid needed to forward an honest and earnest attempt to remove a grave difficulty in the path of the Imperial policy."

Among a host of guarded opinions, the feeling thus expressed by The Times is prominent in the comments of all the papers.

The Standard remarks the extraordinary fact that the Chief Secretary for Ireland in a Unionist Cabinet, in introducing the land bill, should receive such universal and convincing tokens of good will.

The Daily Telegraph believes the bargain will be an excellent one, and one which the country will receive with a sense of positive relief.

The Daily News congratulates Mr. Wyndham and the government on the boldness with which they have faced an absolutely vital issue.

The Morning Post thinks it is unlikely that the appointment of Mr. Wrench as one of the estate commissioners will satisfy any party in Ireland, and regrets that such an appointment should be exposed to the risk of objection.

In an interview, Timothy Healy says he calculates that the tenants will pay twenty-five years purchase for the hold in under the new bill. He understood that the bill had undergone more transmutations than the late Mr. Gladstone's bill of 1881. He anticipates that the government will adopt a give-and-take attitude in committee, and that the bill will emerge from the committee stage much improved.

The Irish members of the House of Commons are receiving serious criticism of the Irish Land Bill, until the text is published, and are awaiting the decision of the convention of Irish Nationalists to be held in Dublin April 14 for the purpose of considering the bill, before committing themselves to a definite policy.

John Redmond wrote the following for the Associate Press:

"The Land bill in many respects is a far-reaching and important measure. It proposes a loan for the purpose of enabling the landlords to be bought out to the extent of a hundred million pounds in addition to a bonus not to be repaid, to amount to at least twelve million pounds. The bill does not fill all the requirements of the case. It does not provide as good terms either for the landlords or tenants as proposed at the recent land conference, but it marks an enormous advance on any measure of its kind hitherto proposed by an English government. It is the direct result of the unity of the National movement in Ireland, and the National party in Parliament for the last three years, which led to the breakdown of coercion in Ireland, and which induced the landlords to come to the conclusion that their interests lay in making friends with the Irish people instead of continuing in conflict with them. The land conference which ensued spoke in the name of United Ireland."

"Regarding the result of this measure, I cannot speak with any certainty. In details, many of which seem to me highly objectionable, are capable of improvement by discussion. If this measure should provide, as every one hopes, a

retlement of the land question, not only will a great social and industrial problem be put once for all on a sound basis, but it will make a concession to home rule in answer to the united demand of all classes in Ireland a certainty in the near future.

"Until the clauses of the bill are actually in my hand, I cannot say, of course, whether they will actually carry out the project in view. Therefore, I cannot say to a certainty if the bill will be accepted by the national convention which assembles in Dublin April 14. This great assembly will have the deciding voice in the matter. If it rejects the bill, the measure will be dead. If it accepts it subject to certain amendments, it is quite possible the bill may be moulded in committee into such a shape that it will entirely transform Ireland."
