Mussolini Pact Not Officially Approved

GENEVA, Switzerland, May 24—(A.P.)—League of Nations quarters were informed today that the Mussolini four-power pact has not yet been accepted and that smaller powers are carrying on a fight to attenuate its revisionist features.

Poland has protested against the pact and was rumored to have even threatened to resign from the League if it is accepted. Poland has been joined in opposition by Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Rumania.

Leaders Clash In Title Incident

Canadians May Be Granted Titles By the King Without Approval of Parliament, is Claim.

OTTAWA, May 24—Premier R. B. Bennett declined today to say there would be no titles granted to Canadians until Parliament has considered the broad question of the acceptance of honors from the King. Titles could be granted by the King, Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberals was told, without the consent or approval of Parliament or ministers. It was the considered view of the government the Nickle anti-titles resolution of 1919 no longer restrained Canadians from accepting titles.

Verdict Of Acquittal Ends Mooney Trial

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24.—(A.P.)—A directed verdict of acquittal abruptly ended Thomas J. Mooney's new murder trial here today on the long dormant 1916 Preparedness Day bombing indictment to which he has looked as a weapon in his fight for vindication. Mooney, who previously had announced he would immediately ask Governor James Rolph Jr., to pardon him, was whisked out of the court room and back to San Quentin prison, where he is serving a life sentence on a conviction of a like charge. "I am very happy," said Mooney as handcuffs were applied to his wrists, "in spite of the fact that I could not verbally deny my guilt."

Although there was no apparent progress in Saskatchewan conferences it was thought Parliament would prorogue Friday, if not tomorrow. All other provinces were in agreement.

Marks New Era For Education In P. E. Island

Additional Year, Bringing P. W. C. To Status Of Full Junior College, Will Be Inaugurated At The Next College Term.

A fourth year course in Prince of Wales College will be established at the opening of the next college term, it was decided at a meeting this week of the Provincial Board of Education. The addition of a fourth year will bring the institution up to the requirements of a full Junior College and will enable students completing this course to obtain their B. A. degree by taking only two years at the mainland universities, or, if they do not wish to qualify for this degree they may proceed directly to take up the professional courses in medicine, dentistry and law at these universities.

Roosevelt Favors Extension Of Import Taxes

WASHINGTON, May 24—(A.P.)—The Roosevelt administration favors the extension for another year of the United States import taxes on coal, copper, lumber and oil as a part of the pending revenue public works legislation.

Ghandi Unable To Sit Up As Five Days Remain

POONA, India, May 24—Devidas Gandhi, son of the Mahatma, in a cable to his brother in South Africa said today that their father was unable to sit up by himself or even to turn in bed. The vitality of Gandhi, who began a fast in protest against the status of India's "untouchables" on May 8, was said by his son to be slowly ebbing away. It is believed here, however, that since less than five days of the fast period remain, the Mahatma will survive the ordeal.
