It is remarkable also, Mr. Speaker, that where Premier Bell and his followers did not speak in that campaign, the educational tax carried, and if it had been carried throughout the Province it would have solved the educational question of today. We see once more that the Liberal Governments of this Province have always been at least ten or fifteen years behind the progressive policies of every Conservative Government. It has taken them eleven years to find out that the Conservative Government of 1919 was right, that they had a policy for the future that would have settled our educational difficulties. (Applause).
