Ensign Simpson has sent \$50.00 to England within the last week, to supply these men with weekly boxes of food to keep them from starving.

POLICE COURT.—The man, Tanner, charged with being an inmate of a disorderly house on Lower Prince Street, conducted by a woman, named McQuarrie, appeared before the Court yesterday morning, and was ordered to appear again on Monday morning. Tanner, who came here from Nova Scotia, is an ex-soldier. He was for a time under treatment in the Sanatorium and in one of the hospitals. He appears to be very feeble in health and has no money. He broke into tears when he told the Magistrate he had no place to stay. The Children's Aid Society are dealing with the girls who were arrested. The three children of the McQuarrie woman will be sent to one of the orphanages. Florence Bell is being sent to the Girls' Home in Truro; Rose McDonald will be sent to the Home of the Good Shepherd, Halifax. The Salvation Army have promised to look after Mrs. McQuarrie.

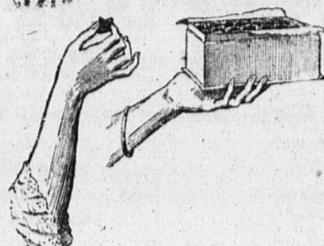

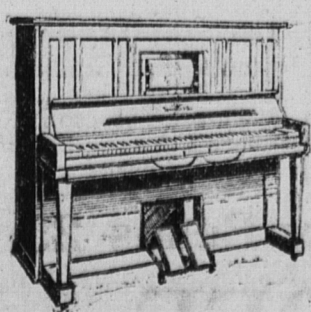
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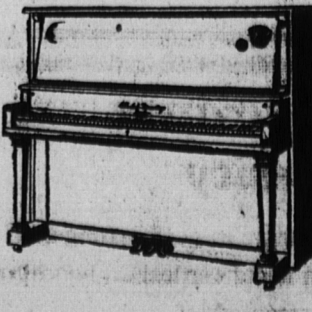
