REGINA, Sept. 15.—(CP)—Task of pedalling a bicycle through swarms of prairie grasshoppers equals and hazard of a round-the-world trip that led through the jungles of Malay and the Arabian desert, said 24-year-old Allan Pendlebury upon his arrival in Regina recently on a trip round the world by bicycle and steamer.

Young Pendlebury left his home in Lancashire two years ago to fulfil a boyhood ambition to see the world.



**LIVELY STEPS**

"The season of 1938 will always be remembered as the one which put the 'Big Apple' on the dance floor." This from The Times which elaborates on the theme on the editorial page:

"Not content with this triumph (smacking ever so faintly of the harvest festival or the village show) it has proved that what yesterday's Mayfair will be learning today," The Times says.

"The Big Apple, the Palais Glide (said to originate from Blackpool), and the Lambeth Walk have challenged the long, lecherous reign of the One-Step and the Fox Trot on the ball rooms of the West End. During past seasons it has been common to hear of chaperons winking and nodding over their vigilant task. They have ever been known to doze off into a pleasant dream of a second supper only to wake up and find that the dream was true. The advent of these new dances might well encourage elderly gentlemen with happy memories of the Lancers, Quadrilles and St. Roger de Coverly to polish up their pumps again...

**UNDERGROUND GARAGE PLANNED AT OTTAWA**
