TO OPEN ROAD - A tractor plow which will be sent out today afternoon to break down the snow on the Charlottetown - Summerside highway in preparation for a wheel plow which will be sent out today in an effort to open the road for wheeled traffic. The highway has been blocked since the first of January. Seven tractors were encountered yesterday as the machine worked in the direction of Hunter River. This preparatory work was done to smash heavy snow and make the work of the regular plow that much easier.

GEESSE MIGRATION IN FULL SWING - Game officials announced last night the northward migration of wild geese is in full swing. They said the first birds reached here about three days ago and now geese are to be found on both north and south shores of the province. The date of arrival is somewhat ahead of that usual since the disappearance of ice grass. It was learned since 1933 the geese usually do not begin arriving in numbers until early in April. Prior to 1933, however, the spring migration reached here usually about March 17. There is sufficient feed for the birds, game officials said. Some are feeding in rivers and others are feeding off stubble fields.

18,194 pupils Are enrolled

There were 18,194 pupils enrolled in Prince Edward Island schools in 1941, the report of the department of education, tabled yesterday in the provincial Legislature indicated. The percentage of attendance was 70.6 which was described in the report as the "lowest made in any Canadian Province".

Table report of Pensions Commission

Total cost of old age pensions in Prince Edward Island in 1941 was \$269,855, of which \$179,916 was paid by the province and \$89,939 by the federal government. The report was tabled in the provincial Legislature. Net expenditures on pensions to the blind amounted to \$4,879.
