N. S. Minister Sees defects In grain plan

HALIFAX, Feb. 15—(CP)—Agriculture Minister John A. MacDonaldd said today the Governments of the three Maritime Provinces have no assurance that "a possible rise in the price of feed grains" might not wipe out any benefits they would get by the Dominion paying half the cost of freighting the grain to eastern points from the Great Lakes.

"The question, therefore, still remains one of endeavouring to obtain from federal authorities, if possible, some assurance that feed grains will be available at the lakehead at prices that will make it possible to derive some benefit from the latest federal offer, if accepted."

"In the meantime, the Nova Scotia Government is considering other policies of assistance to the farming industry which would provide a more permanent benefit in encouraging lines of production in which expansion is needed."

A COLOSSAL COTTON ORDER OF 20,000,000 YARDS FROM SOUTH AFRICA TO LANCAIRES Orders amounting in all to 20,000,000 yards have been placed with the Lancashire cotton industry by the South African Government. Much of the material is in keener demand at home but South Africa will be given first call upon it. The class of cloth wanted is largely for "drills" which are such an important part of military equipment. "Denims" are also required. These usually needed for overall cloth are already being used on a colossal scale for the Civilian Defense Forces in Britain. South Africa's orders are complicated with a large item for "ducks" The last generation remembers these tent clothes as made of pure flax. Nowadays not many tent "ducks" are made of linen and now that fax is short the cotton trade are meeting this new demand more cheaply and as serviceably as before.
