## Protests Complicate Memorial Cup Series

OTTAWA, April 2—(AP)—Two protests over the eligibility of players today complicated the Memorial Cup playdowns in which Halifax St. Mary's holds a 2 to 1 lead over Inkerman Rockets in their best-of-five-game series.

Both teams charged their opponents with using players who were ineligible.

The latest complaint came from the Rockets. Inkerman's manager Lloyd Laporte charged that St. Mary's Bill Franklin was not properly transferred to the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association from Ottawa, where he played last year.

Laporte's counter-attack followed charges from St. Mary's officials that Hugh Riopelle should not be playing for Rockets. They based their complaint on allegations that Riopelle had played too many games in senior hockey for Army.

Both complaints were dumped into the lap of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association secretary, George S. Dudley, at Midland, Dudley, so far, has been keeping quiet on the subject.

James MacDonald, St. Mary's manager, reported that he had telephoned the C. A. H. A. secretary to find out how his complaint stood. According to MacDonald, Dudley referred him to Cecil Duncan, secretary of the Ottawa and District Hockey Association.

Duncan first fielded the play by telling reporters: "I'm off hockey—I'm out of hockey."

Later, however, he said, there was no proof that Riopelle had played five games for Army.

"Having his name in the paper doesn't constitute proof that Riopelle actually played in every game. That is a point that will have to be cleared up."

The standing in complaints and counter-complaints, tonight was: Inkerman's Laporte claimed that St. Mary's two victories should be thrown out and ordered replayed.

local anglers, while not openly condoning this practice, are nevertheless loath to report infractions that come to their notice to the proper authorities.

With a view to tightening up on the restrictions regarding Ruffed Grouse (native partridge) under the Game Act the P. E. I. Fish and Game Association were responsible for having some new amendments passed at the recent sitting of the Provincial Legislature. No person may have Ruffed Grouse in possession, whether in storage or otherwise except for a period of 30 days following the close of the open season.

Until this spring anyone could have Ruffed Grouse in storage, providing they were killed in the open season, the year "round" if they so wished... and many did so wish. From now on it is an offense to have Ruffed Grouse in possession between the 1st day of December and the 30th day of September in each year. Formerly it was an offense to sell game but the buyer could go scott free. Now the buyer as well as the seller may be penalized. This move was made in an effort to stop the commercializing of our game birds.

Our Legislators' however, turned down the recommendation of the Game Association that the season on rabbits open on November 1st and close on January 31st. The season on rabbits will run from Nov. 15th, till Jan. 31st. It is the consensus of opinion that many gunners tramping the woods during the first weeks of November are more interested in a plump Ruffed Grouse, Hungarian partridge or pheasant than bagging a brown, skinny tick infested rabbit. Toward the latter part of the month after a few sharp frosts and snow flurries rabbits prime up and begin to turn white. At this stage they are considered good game and are tops when dished up in the form of a pot pie but neither are they to be scooped at when stewed, fried or baked.

Many members of our Provincial Government are showing a marked interest in matters pertaining to the betterment of our game. All true sportsmen and lovers of our wildlife will be heartened by this new outlook on the part of our Legislators.

## X Ray Centre

Whenever conversation turns to X-raying, someone is apt to say that it doesn't matter about the grown-ups, but every one of the children should be done. As an expression of love for children this may be an admirable sentiment, but if all acted upon it the children would be deprived of their best protection against tuberculosis.

A child below 12 years old is not apt to have tuberculosis. The danger is that as he grows older he may catch the disease from one of his associates. If one of his family develops active TB the growing child, as well as every other person in the household, will be in peril until the disease is discovered.

The danger of continued exposure to TB was recognized by educational authorities and it was decided that all school teachers must have regular X-ray examinations. The law thus protects the pupil against TB infection from his teacher. It does not protect him from infection by his own home. Only his own parents can do that by ensuring that all members of the family are X-rayed at regular intervals.

All children in grades 7 and up will be asked to attend the X-ray center by classes. Since experience indicates that children below 12 are the only age group who do not require X-ray examinations they are not asked to attend.

However, if parents wish to have children between 6 and 12 X-rayed, they may bring them to the X-Ray Center for examination.

OTTAWA, April 2 — (CP) — Hamilton Tigers tonight advanced into the Allan Cup semi-finals by defeating Renfrew Lions 6-5 after 30 minutes overtime. The two teams battled from the opening face-off in a nip-and-tuck game that kept the fans roaring.

Successful in their quest for the league championship this year, they were eliminated by the Navy on the same night that the hockey team was beaten by Acadia. The score: Navy 35, S.D.U. 23. The intercollegiate series with P.W.C. still remains to be played.
