they found the building unsatisfactory and the site not what it should be—notwithstanding the fact that the site was selected by an expert in that particular line—he might have asked for a cash settlement at that time, and I believe the Dominion Government would have given it to him."

FIXES RESPONSIBILITY

Now, Mr. Speaker, if the Minister of Agriculture had not heard of this claim before last year, when he was not in this House, it certainly was not because the claim was not put forward; because it was put forward, and very definitely, two years ago. But of course the Minister did not reply to that. He has a convenient method of not answering when occasion suits!

The Minister's explanation of the Dalton Sanatorium matter is this: He says that he and the late Hon. Benjamin Gallant, Sir Charles Dalton, Mr. Wyatt and Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh went to Ottawa to discuss this matter with a committee of the Dominion Government; and he mentions, as members of this committee, Senator Loughheed, Hon. Mr. McCurdy, Federal Minister of Public Works, and Mr. Wigmore. The result of that conference, so far as this Province and the Dalton Sanatorium were concerned, was nil. The delegation came back empty handed. He says the committee from the Dominion Government "did not know what we were going up there for; they had no intimation of what we were going for." And I would ask the Minister of Agriculture now: Did he know himself what he was going for?

Hon. Mr. Lea: If my hon. friend does not know after me telling him, it is no use repeating it.

Dr. McMillan: Not very much, because I have all your remarks here, and I think the explanation that the Minister of Agriculture gave to the House was that they were just going up there at the instance of Sir Charles Dalton to see what could be done, and that my hon. friend had no definite ideas in his head about it. When he was asked by some of the members representing the Dominion Government what he had in mind regarding compensation he said he had

nothing in mind! He could give no answer. He said certain amounts were discussed—\$50,000, \$75,000, \$100,000; different amounts; but he was not in a position to say. And they were asking him would he take a cash settlement.

Hon. Mr. Lea: They were not! Dr. McMillan: They were asking the Minister of Agriculture would he take a cash settlement.

Hon. Mr. Lea: They never asked such a question.

Dr. McMillan: They were asking the Minister of Agriculture if he would take a cash settlement on behalf of the Government of Prince Edward Island. (Applause).

Hon. Mr. Lea: Mr. Speaker, that statement is not correct.

Dr. McMillan: I am informed that it is correct, by Sir Charles Dalton, by Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh, and by Mr. J. E. Wyatt. (Applause).

Hon. Mr. Lea: Why wasn't that put in their report? Read their report!

Dr. McMillan: I don't know why it was not put in their report; but I am giving you the statement I received from these gentlemen.

Hon. Mr. Lea: The offer was never made.

Dr. McMillan: That is what you say. But these gentlemen do not agree with you.

ADMITS POSSESSION OF AGREEMENT

In the discussion on the Draft Address, when my hon. friend was speaking on this subject, I said: "Will the Minister allow me to ask him a question? Did he have a copy of the agreement made between the Government of Canada and the Government of this Province?" And the Hon. Mr. Lea replied: "We had at that time, but that was not what we went to Ottawa for."

Hon. Mr. Lea: That is correct.

Dr. McMillan: Then you had a copy of the agreement?

Hon. Mr. Lea: It might have been on file; I didn't have it.

Dr. McMillan: Well, what did you say you had it for?

Hon. Mr. Lea: It might have been on file. I didn't have it with me.

Dr. McMillan: I didn't ask you whether it might be on file. I asked you: Did you have a copy of that?

After passing a bill authorizing the increasing of the interest rate on certain debentures from 4 1-2 to 5 1-2 percent if found necessary (the House dividing on a straight party vote of 12 to 6 against an amendment moved by Mr. Stewart limiting the rate to 5 percent) and after passing another bill providing for a retiring allowance of \$500 to Abram Bonnell Bursar of Falconwood, the House adjourned till 3 p. m.

The afternoon and evening sessions were taken up with the debate on the budget, the following members speaking: Dr. McMillan, Hon. Mr. Butler, Mr. Bruce, Hon. Mr. Allan Sinclair, Mr. Wright, Mr. Allan Stewart, Mr. R. D. McLean. At 11 p. m. Mr. McLean moved the adjournment of the debate and the House adjourned until 10 a. m. Wednesday.

agreement? and you said: "We had at that time." That was your answer. You had it at that time, but that was not what you went to Ottawa for.

Hon. Mr. Lea: The agreement was on file. I didn't have it with me.

Dr. McMillan: Where was it?

Hon. Mr. Lea: Probably here somewhere; on file at the office.

Dr. McMillan: How do you know it was on file?

Hon. Mr. Lea: Because you have often told us that it was.

Dr. McMillan: We have had to tell you very often. That was one statement made by my hon. friend. Now I have a copy of his remarks in the budget debate. On the very same subject, at the very same point, he says: "We had a right to some compensation; furthermore it is claimed that there was an agreement to that effect, but I never saw the agreement."

Hon. Mr. Lea: Neither I did.

Dr. McMillan: There it is! He says he had the agreement but he never saw it. That shows how well posted the Minister of Agriculture was when he went to Ottawa? (Applause). He was there to negotiate between the Government which he represented and the Government of Canada on a most important question, involving compensation for damage to the extent of many thousands of dollars, and he had not even seen, nor has he yet seen, the agreement between the Governments! Now haven't we a right to say that he fell down on the job! (Loud applause).

Hon. Mr. Lea: No, not at all!

Dr. McMillan: Well, we will say it anyway; and we believe that the country will agree with us! (Applause).

Hon. Mr. Lea: Did Nova Scotia get any compensation?

Dr. McMillan: I am not discussing Nova Scotia's claims.

Hon. Mr. Lea: And the Minister of the Crown in the Conservative Government was from the Province of Nova Scotia, and he didn't get anything for Kentville Sanatorium.

CASE ENTIRELY DIFFERENT

Dr. McMillan: Our case was entirely different from that of Nova Scotia. We had a definite agreement with the Dominion Government, and we have the word of those gentlemen who were there that if any effort was to be made, that was the time to make it; that a cash settlement was possible. But of course when the hon. gentleman representing the Government of this Province did not know what was in the agreement between the two Governments; when he didn't have an idea in his head about compensation; when he was unable to express any opinion on the matter when he was asked by a Minister of the Dominion Government, it is quite easy to understand why he didn't get anything. Why? Simply because the hon. gentleman representing this Government, the present Minister of Agriculture, was not posted. He did not know what he was there for! And I am quite right in saying that he lost an opportunity to benefit this Province, and I say The Guardian is quite right when they draw attention to the matter.

Hon. Mr. Lea: Why didn't they do it eight years ago? Why did it take them eight years to find that out?

Dr. McMillan: I have already read my statement on the matter in the Session of 1928. My hon. friend used another argument the other night. He said "Why didn't your Government do something when you came in?"

Hon. Mr. Lea: I guess so!

Dr. McMillan: You don't need to guess, because you should know very well what happened. The Bell Government, of which the present Minister of Agriculture was a responsible member, not only failed to press our claims for compensation for the Dalton Sanatorium. They dismantled the institution and destroyed the legal claim and closed the door so far as legal compensation was concerned; and now there is only a moral claim. That is the situation, Mr. Speaker! (Applause). The real fact of the matter is that the Premier of that Government was never interested in public health, but that he was objecting to the Dalton Sanatorium from the beginning, that he would have nothing to do with it; and so far as I am in a position to judge I do not think the hon. Minister of Agriculture was very far behind him in that attitude, because he had an opportunity and he lost it, and this Province lost the compensation established by the agreement, of which he admits he had never seen a copy! So that is where we are regarding this claim, which he says is only urged now to injure him politically.

Hon. Mr. Lea: That is all.

DESERVED CRITICISM

Dr. McMillan: Well, if it injures you politically you deserve to be injured. (Applause). When a man comes out as a representative of the public he has certain responsibilities and duties thrust upon him. If he neglects those responsibilities, if he fails to carry out those duties as he ought to do, and if he meets with criticism and this criticism hurts him, that is his own lookout! (Applause).

Hon. Mr. Lea: It is not hurting.

Dr. McMillan: That is all right, then, if it is not hurting. We are not saying it to hurt you; we are saying it is a pity that a claim like this should have been bungled when it should have been settled satisfactorily. (Applause). That is the pity of it, that the people of this Province had to dig generously into their pockets to raise another \$100,000 which might have been obtained when the Dalton Sanatorium was closed, because at that time there was a Board of Reparations dealing with those matters, and other claims were adjusted. They had the agreement there.

But my hon. friend says: "We couldn't get anything out of a Tory Government anyway." I would like to ask, Mr. Speaker: When did that Tory Government go out of power? In 1921. And who succeeded it? Was it a Tory Government or a Liberal Government? Didn't they have their own Government there after 1921? And did they ever make any attempt to press the claim? No, they were satisfied to take the word of a Deputy Minister: We see how much attention is paid to the word of Deputy Ministers nowadays, in my hon. friend's own department! (Applause). They were satisfied to take the answer; "No you have no claim," when all they had to do was produce the agreement made between the two Governments, and see which would have the most weight, an agreement signed between the Federal Government and this Province or the word of the Deputy Minister of the Soldiers' Re-establishment. Which would be the most binding, Mr. Speaker? (Applause).
