Five Killed In Plane Crash

(By The Associated Press) WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 18 — A Trans World Airline Constellation transport on a training flight crashed and burned today, killing all five occupants.

Barely missing a heavily-travelled four-lane highway, the big four-engined airliner struck a ditch approaching the north-south runway at New Castle Airport, and went out of control, said a T. W. A. statement.

The landing gear buckled. One of the wings was ripped off and the ship was torn nearly in two. Flames enveloped the wreckage and burned furiously, destroying the craft before firemen could reach the scene. Wreckage was scattered over a 100-yard area.

There were no passengers on the plane when it crashed. Capt. F. X. Winkler, 28; E. L. Christensen, 33; V. G. Kennedy, 33; Flight Engineer Richard De Camp, 38, 38; and Herbert Dowsett, Jr., 29, Civil Aeronautics Authority inspector, Henolulu.

King George Offers To Pay Increase In Princess' Allowance

LONDON, Nov. 18 — (CP) — The King today lent aid by royal wedding week by offering to increase Princess Elizabeth's £15,000 (\$60,000) annual government allowance out of his own savings to avoid "burden on Britons in a time of economic stress."

In a brief message to Parliament that evoked thunderous cheers and enriched the Commonwealth's already warm feelings for his family, the King said he, rather than the Government, should put up whatever additional money the Princess and Lieut. Philip Mountbatten will need after their wedding in Westminster Abbey Thursday.

When the Commons meets tomorrow it will be asked to approve the appointment of an all-party committee to consider the King's message. Court circles, newspapers and the people had expected that the Treasury would boost the Princess' income and award a separate allowance to Lieut. Mountbatten, who has no income other than the \$33.62 weekly he gets as an officer in the Royal Navy. His pay will be increased to \$53.90 when he gets the Royal Navy's marriage allowance and is posted to London.

Meanwhile, the Princess and her sailor fiance spent the day in a gay round of public and private functions in anticipation of the wedding. They entertained 2,500 invited guests from various walks of life who crowded into St. James' Palace to see the mounted collection of wedding presents sent by well-wishers all over the world.

Romsey Hampshire, England, Nov. 18 — (CP) — When Princess Elizabeth and Lieut. Philip Mountbatten arrive here for their honeymoon Thursday night they will be welcomed by a Southern Railway machine shop workman, who happens to be the Mayor of Romsey. Even now Reg Symes, formally known as Alderman R. G. Symes, is brushing up his Sunday suit in readiness for the momentous meeting at the station when the bridal couple step off a special train from Waterloo Station.
