Mrs. Ethel Lemaire and Mrs. Maud Lemaire, who married twin brothers, will contest the will of the late George Poole of Taunton, who was shot by his son, Howard, at his home a few weeks ago. The two sisters married twin brothers, who are doctors and graduates of the University of Vermont, George Poole, who shot his father, was released on the ground that his parent was insane at the time, and the young man acted in self-defence. Mrs. Geo. Poole and her three sons will not deny the contentions of the daughters.
