Schedule Of Another Thriller Expected Tonight In Final Game Of Junior Playdowns

MIDLAND, Ont., March 4—The revised schedule for the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association eastern playdowns this year was released today by George Dooly, vice president of the C.A.H.A.

The schedule follows:
Senior Series
March 19 and 22—Maritimes vs. Quebec, both games in Montreal. If third game necessary, to be played March 24 and following dates advanced one day.

March 24 and 26 or 27—Winner Maritime-Quebec series vs. Ottawa district. First game to be played at Montreal, second at Ottawa. If Maritimes win, both games will be held at Ottawa.
March 29 and 31—Winner of games March 24 and 26 vs. Ontario Hockey Association winners. First game to be held at Toronto, second game in Ottawa April 2. If Maritime team defeats Quebec and Ottawa, both games with O.H.A. to be in Toronto.

March 29 and 31—Maritime vs. Ottawa district, both games to be played at Ottawa. If third game is necessary, to be held March 24.
March 24 and 26 or 27—Winner of Maritime-Ottawa district series plays Quebec winners. If Maritimes win from Ottawa district both games to be held in Montreal. If Ottawa wins from Maritimes, home and home games will be played with Quebec winners, with first game at Ottawa. A third game, if necessary, will be played March 29.

March 31 and April 2 or 3—Eastern junior final. Winner of O.H.A. to play winner of Maritime-Ottawa district-Quebec series. If Maritimes are in eastern finals both games will be at Toronto. If Ottawa or Quebec emerge into finals, home-and-home games will be held with the O.H.A. winners, both games to be at Toronto. April 5 will be date for the third game, if necessary.

Memorial Cup finals will be played April 7, 9, 12, 14, and 16. The venue will be selected later on the ice of the team winning the eastern finals.

Junior City League honors, a berth in the Levee playdowns and the Aiken Trophy are all at stake tonight when the Abbies and Rangers take to the ice at the Forum for the third and deciding game of the Junior playdowns, a series that has produced by far the most thrilling, spectacular brand of hockey ever displayed by local juniors.

There seems to be no telling just what hockey heights these two fast, clever squads will reach once a game gets underway. The two games played to date have pleased even the most severe hockey critics and tonight with everything they have been battling for all season at stake it is likely that the better rivals will even outdo their previous efforts—if that is possible.

There is no favorites for tonight's game—it would be foolhardy attempting to pick one—and that is as it should be. Fans would have to travel a long distance to find two more evenly matched squads and two that will put so much fight and spirit into their encounters. Both never know when they are beaten: Rangers showed that plainly in the first game and Wednesday night the Abbies proved how far flaming courage and a never-say-die spirit will carry a team when the odds seem hopelessly against them.

Abbies' thrilling victory, snatched out of the jaws of defeat, pepped up the morale of the squad just when it was at a low ebb and now they will be tougher than ever to put out of the running. Rangers, set back so suddenly on their heels Wednesday night will get back into the fray tonight just as courageous and full of fight as ever. True, they were mightily disappointed but that game is history now and tonight with it all behind them they will bend with a will to the task that lies before them—and what a task it will be for both squads, attempting to eliminate each other from the playdowns.

And at last, after a season of low attendances, the juniors have caught the fancy of the fans. Those last two games have been the talk of the town and with the final coming up it is expected that tonight the largest crowd ever to witness a junior game in this city will be on hand to cheer on their respective favorites.

Immediately after the game tonight, providing that the encounter doesn't end in a deadlock, the beautiful W. R. Aiken Trophy will be presented to the winning squad by His Worship Mayor Turner.
