CANADIAN LOYALTY AND MR. TARTE.

It needs no protestations to demonstrate Canadian loyalty to the Mother Country. The history of the struggles against invasion in the wars of 1776 and 1812, the rejection of the more seductive movements towards annexation and independence in the generation preceeding Confederation, all demonstrate the well-grounded fealty of the Canadian people to the Sovereign and the Flag of the Empire. And we may say as much of the Government of the day and of the Administrations which preceded it. Sir John Macdonald and his successors in the Conservative leadership, and his and their colleagues were men of well approved loyalty. In like manner Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues have demonstrated by acts that are eloquent beyond words their fidelity to our common Flag and Sovereign. In the preferential tariff and in the little army of Canadians that have fought and endured so well in South Africa, we see the unmistakable evidence of a loyalty that is true and beyond pretence.

It is therefore with more profound regret that loyal Canadians read from time to time the indiscreet, ill-timed and most misleading language used by Hon. Mr. Tarte during his present official visit to France. We have before directed attention to one or more of these utterances which place our Dominion and its Government in a false and unfavorable light. Another instance is now thrust upon the public notice. On a recent public occasion in Paris Mr. Tarte introduced the question which he said he had often been asked, "What would be the attitude of Canada in the event of war between England and France?" Before we quote his answer we pause to ask what must be thought of a Canadian statesman who would needlessly raise such an issue before an inflammable, anti-British audience in Paris? Be it observed that there are dangerous diplomatic questions still pending between the two countries, and though we have enjoyed peace for two generations, we were within a brief time past on the verge of war over the Fashoda incident. It is a still briefer time since Paris rang with cries of "Down with the English!" and public and widely circulated Paris journals were disgraced with indecent caricatures of our beloved Queen.

Before such audience Mr. Tarte chooses to raise the question, "What would be the attitude of Canada in the event of war between Britain and France?" And his own answer to his own needless question is that "Canada could stand alone and let Europe do what she liked." In other words his language appears to express the veiled treason of Premier Schreiner at the moment of the outbreak in South Africa when he proposed to Sir Alfred Milner that Cape Colony should observe "a strict neutrality" in regard to the Boer invasion. Very different was the reply of Dr. Franklin just before the Revolutionary War which lost the Thirteen Colonies to Britain. He too was asked what the Colonies would do if Britain were engaged in war in Europe—would they support the Mother Country? Dr. Franklin then answered: "I think they would, so far as their circumstances would permit. They consider themselves as part of the British Empire and as having common interests with it." Franklin afterward joined in the great revolt, but down to the very eve of the outbreak he seems to have held a higher and worthier conception of the duties of a Colony than that which Mr. Tarte has conveyed to the people of Paris.

The language and attitude of Mr. Tarte are an offence to the loyal people of Canada. They can please no true friend of Canada. They tend to prejudice in the minds of the people, unfairly we think, the Administration of which Mr. Tarte is a prominent member. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who has thrown his shield over Mr. Tarte, declaring him "a loyal man," and Sir Wilfrid's loyal colleagues and supporters must see that the country will hold

them, in a measure at least, responsible for what Mr. Tarte may say and has said. They must see, too, that it is within the bounds of possibility that in the not distant future Britain and France might be involved in hostilities against each other. What would be the fate of a "neutral" Minister and a "neutrality" Government in Canada in such a regrettable crisis? Or even if during the coming election another Fashoda incident should darken the diplomatic sky, what would be the effect of such language as Mr. Tarte's upon a loyal Canadian electorate? Is it not clear as the sun at noonday, that if Mr. Tarte is uncontrolled, if he must prate that Canada becomes more French from year to year and would remain neutral in a war with France—is it not clear that it would be prudent to divest his utterances of all official character and that his voice should be raised outside of the Administration rather than within it?

THE GUARDIAN's attention has been directed to the fact that the gates at farm crossings on the Southern Railway now under construction are too narrow for the passage of certain kinds of farm machinery. It appears that the regulation gate is made 12 feet between the posts. The average self-binding reaper is wider than this. One farmer tells us that his binder, of a common pattern, measures 13 feet 6 inches across. Any farm gateway ought to be made wide enough to drive a harvesting machine through without inconvenience or delay. We feel assured that when their attention is now directed to the matter the authorities will see to it that the gates are made wide enough for the passage of any kind of farm machinery.

There are 23 so-called treaty ports in China at which, under various conventions commerce is carried on with other countries. These treaty ports range in population from 20,000 up to 1,800,000 each, those of over a quarter million population being as follows: Canton, 1,800,000; Tien Tsin, 950,000; Hankow, 800,000; Foo Chow, 636,000; Shanghai, 430,000; Ningpo, 255,000; Chung King, 250,000.

It is estimated that the Roman Catholics have nearly a million adherents in China and that Protestants number about 50,000.
