**Another Raider Named**

MONTEVIDEO, Jan. 25.—It is reported here that the German raider that has been operating off Brazilian Coast is neither the Moewe nor Vinet but the Cap Ortegai, a Hamburg South American Liner. The Cap Ortegai, is said to have evaded the British fleet after leaving Hamburg in disguise. According to this story the converted liner captured two British steamers which had sailed from the River Plate and took them to a port on the west coast of Africa where they were armed and manned and then started out to raid shipping routes.

**PIE SOCIAL AND ENTERTAINMENT.**

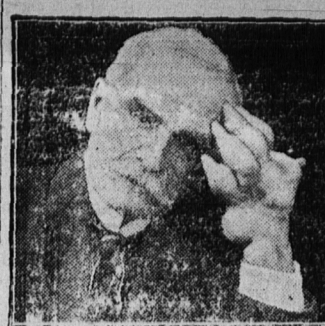
