FRENCH FRIGATE IN PORT — The French Frigate L'Aventure, docked at the Marine wharf about 2 p.m. yesterday. Being of the Frigate class, she has a displacement of about 1600 tons. Her main armament is four inch guns, and is equipped with radar and radar gun control. Carrying a complement of about nine officers and 120 ratings, the L'Aventure is doing fisheries protection work, providing medical care etc. for the French fishing fleet off the Grand Banks. The ship, under the command of Captain Georges Jacquot De Presle, will be in port until Tuesday the 17th when she will leave for St. Pierre. This ship was built in Scotland during the war and purchased by the Free French Forces.

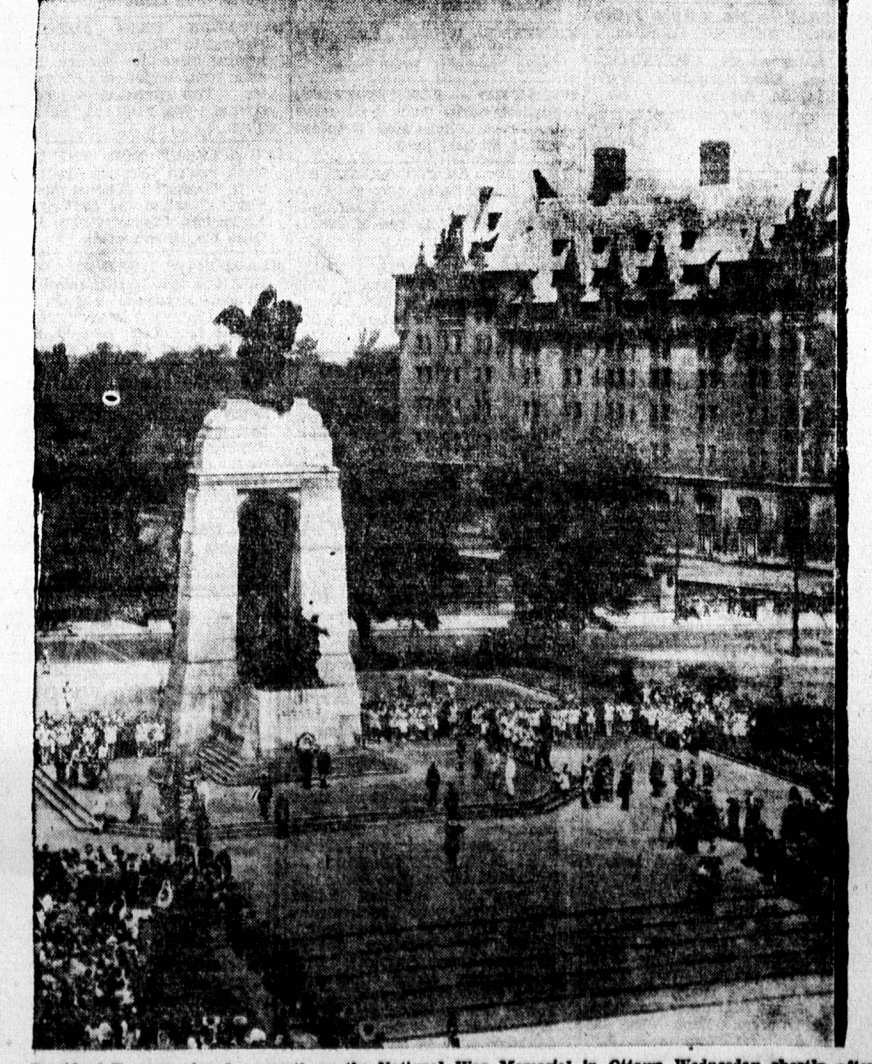
