There are very few foxes left; it is hard to find a pair of good foxes."

**FOX RETURNS**—Official returns to date show that there are now 277 fox ranches in the Island and that silver breeding foxes total 441 males and 452 females. The total number of silver offspring for 1913 was 703 and the assessed value of the average young silver fox for taxation purposes is \$4,592.53 per fox. The total valuation of the young silver black foxes for the current year is \$3,439,449. The total number of silver foxes in the ranches for 1913 is 1,692. The total valuation of the young, including patches, for taxation purposes, is \$3,717,162. The total number of all kinds of foxes in the ranches is 3,130.

**MUCH ENGLISH MONEY IS INVESTED ABROAD.**  
LONDON, Nov. 4.—England's assessed income from abroad, as set forth in the income tax statistics of last year, reached the immense total of \$520,000,000, which represents capital of nearly \$13,000,000,000. These incomes are derived from foreign mines, gasworks, waterworks, tramways, breweries, tea and coffee plantations, nitrate grounds, oil fields, land, financial, telegraph, cable, shipping and insurance companies, branches of banks and mercantile companies, mortgages on property, loans and deposits abroad and pro-fits of all kinds arising from business done abroad by manufacturers, merchants and commission agents. There are 66 with an income of \$375,000 to \$500,000, 37 with incomes of \$275,000 to \$375,000, and 56 with incomes of \$225,000 to \$275,000. Furthermore, there are 4,148 persons with incomes of \$50,000 and over, which means the possession of a capital of \$1,000,000 or more. Consequently the total of persons in the United Kingdom who possess at least \$1,000,000 does not fall short of 4,571.
