The estate left by the deceased is valued at \$42,822, and was left in bequests as follows:—To each of his brothers and sisters, viz.: Mrs. William Russel, Florida, U.S.A.; Mrs. Edward Birch, Belmont, 1st 16; William McLaurin, Bamore River; Henry McLaurin, San Francisco, Cal.; and Arthur McLaurin, Central, Lot 16; he bequeathed \$1000. To William McNeill, Charlottetown, his clerk, \$1000. To St. James Church, \$375. To his widow he left the dwelling house on corner of Prince and Water Streets, City, \$1000 in cash, and, after payment of the above mentioned bequests, the remainder of the estate. The will was made June 5th, 1909, and proved on August 30th, 1909. The executors of the estate are G. H. Gaudet, William McNeill, and Mrs. McLaurin, his widow, all of this city.

A public meeting called by the promoters of the Children's Aid Society movement was held last night in the City Hall. There was a fair attendance. The matter of procuring proper legislation, to aid the Society in its future operations in this Province was handed over to be dealt with by the Council, and they were also ordered to prepare a constitution and bylaws.
