—Marshall Leard, formerly of Seaside, now stenographer in the head office of the D. A. R. at Kentville N. S. who has been visiting his parents for a few days, leaves on return today.

—Judging from remarks on street since the public meeting on Friday evening, the result of the waterworks plebiscite next Friday will depend very largely on the action which will be taken by the Board of Fire Underwriters at their meeting in Charlottetown tonight with reference to the insurance rates in Summerside. It is up to the insurance people to make a definite statement as to the reduction they will make in Summerside rates provided a waterworks system is installed. Vague and indefinite guesses, and hints at reduction are regarded by the general run of voters as mere canvassing dodges, and as the Board meets tonight it will be quite possible to issue a definite statement, which will be a guide to citizens who are voting on the question.

—A piece of road that should be taken as a pattern of good roadmaking in other sections of the province has just been completed in Albany, from A. Lord & Co's store to the three quarters of a mile. It is one of the most beautiful grades on the Island, part the fine farms of Joseph Newman, James Cameron, Edward Trainor, George Burns and J. W. Cameron. This piece of road has always been used as a speedway by owners of fast horses and in its present shape will doubtless be more so. The road is wide enough to accommodate four teams abreast and is as smooth as a race track. It was built under the supervision of William E. Noonan, overseer, and Neil Cameron who is an expert in the use of the road machine. This section of road is now properly called The Albany Speedway.

—The public meeting held in the Market Hall, Summerside, Friday night to receive the report of the waterworks and sewerage commissioners, was a large and representative one and included a number of ladies. The chair was occupied by J. E. Wyatt, T. B. Gandy, secretary of the board of commissioners, explained in detail the work of the board in their search after information, including correspondence with Engineer Lea who made the original survey in 1897 and giving the relative cost of the system in that year and 1907. The total cost of the system in 1897 as given in plans and specifications made by Mr. Lea, was \$97,000. The same system if installed today would cost \$100,000. This estimate was for a system which contained 600 feet less of piping than the system now proposed and which the commissioners have stated will cost \$86,000. Mr. Gandy, then gave a detailed statement of the maintenance and operating expenses of the proposed system, the summary of which has already been given in The Guardian. His excellent explanation of the report was well received and judging by the frequent bursts of applause which punctuated his remarks, was a revelation to many and removed many of the cobwebs that had been hanging over the proposition since it was first mooted. A few questions by Allan McKinnon were satisfactorily answered.

W. K. Rogers, Charlottetown, by invitation of the chairman, gave his views on the probable effect of the installation of waterworks upon insurance rates in Summerside. While not in a position to make a definite statement he gave a comparison of the rates that obtain in Charlottetown and Summerside, showing the very much favorable condition in the former than in the latter. He saw no reason why with waterworks the rates in Summerside could not be relatively reduced. At the close William Stewart moved a vote of thanks to the committee for their excellent, intelligent, honest and commonsense reports. Neil McLeod, Neil MacQuarrie, Capt. Joseph Head and John M. Clark supported the motion each highly complimenting the commissioners and emphasizing the necessity of the proposed waterworks and sewerage system.
