

STEAMER MINTO BACK FROM NORTH—The Sydney Post of Aug. 30th says:—With the whole of the fifty individual members of his crew remarking on the sultriness of the weather in Sydney when the citizens felt like wearing overcoats owing to the chilliness of the air, Captain Field of the government steamer Minto arrived in port from Hudson Straits after a round trip of exactly three weeks. The steamer left here on Sunday, 8th August and since that time when she was loaded pretty well down with provisions and other stores for the various government stations she has called at eight or nine stations in the far north. One of the officers of the steamer remarked that during their trip, which was attended with very fine weather on the outward run, besides discharging stores, they have lighted up quite a few of the lights that were erected last year to give bearings to the whalers and other vessels trading in the icy regions of the north. Some of these lights once they are in will burn for from six to nine months. Others will be extinguished by the last government vessel to come down before the ice packs into the strait. In this case it will be the schooner Buryley. The Minto towed the schooner Buryley to Menzies Island where she herself touched besides the other stations such as Coates Island, Whale Island, Big Island, Button Island, Nottingham, Digs Island, Wikeham Bay. The weather although very cold up there was not at all stormy and fine weather was experienced during the whole time except for a few hours on the run back to Sydney. Some of the sailors who had made the trip for the first time had some amusing stories to tell of their experiences with the Eskimos. They had not had any experiences of any particular interest to relate however and said that the voyage beyond being somewhat of a novelty to them was very uneventful.

would scarcely believe there was a war on at all.

Some of the boys had had some very exciting trips up to the trenches this past few days with "hand grenades" etc. One of my horses is laid up, hope he will be in working order in a few days. I have taken part in a few of the big battles, Neuve, Chapelle, Ypres and Festubert are the three most important ones.

I have had good luck ever since I left Canada and hope it will continue. I used to often wonder Dad what it felt like to be under fire, and also how I would act, but I have solved that problem to my own satisfaction long is better to die in your tracks than be called a coward. I couldn't go home and look you or mother in the face if I ever was guilty of showing the white feather. I know you would rather see me in a soldiers grave in Flanders than come back home with the stigma of cowardice resting upon me. I had one hard test, the hardest I ever hope to experience. I'll write and tell you about it later.

IN MEMORIAM

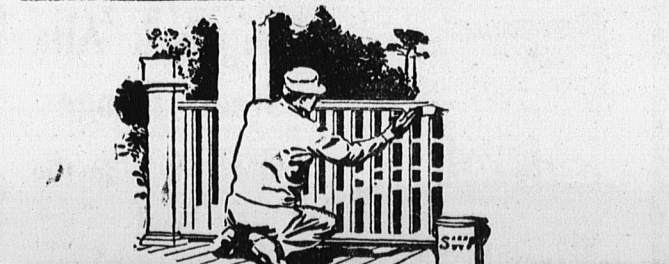
MRS. EDWARD HARDING.
