Church Services

THE BAPTIST CHURCH

Excellent congregations were in attendance at the Baptist Church morning and evening. At the morning service Rev. A. C. Vincent delivered an impressive sermon based on Hagai 1, 2. "The people say the time has not yet come." This was the speaker's final address in connection with the "Keeping the Faith Campaign" which opens today, December 1st. The preacher at the evening service was the Rev. Dr. J. J. Sides whose original and eloquent addresses have made him a favorite speaker throughout this Province. Dr. Sides' sermon, was, as usual, strong, thoughtful and moving.

The music of the day was of the usual high order, the anthem, "Sun of My Soul" was finely rendered by a full choir and Mr. V. L. Dingwell sang expressively "The Ninety and Nine."

ZION CHURCH

Rev. Thomas McConnell addressed the Student Christian Movement meeting at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. Elwood McPherson presided and Mr. Dunning sang a solo. There was quite a large attendance. About sixty students of both sexes greatly enjoyed the address. Mr. McConnell's talk in which he gave reminiscences of his own student days, when he had the privilege of listening to John R. Mott and Robert E. Speer. The remainder of the talk was about the place Christian Missions should occupy in a student's life.

At 11 o'clock Mr. McConnell conducted the morning service in Zion. On account of the severe morning, the attendance was not quite so large as anticipated. Mr. McConnell was in unusually fine form as he talked of "The Encirclement of God's Presence." He spoke of the suffering of Samuel Johnson, in his early days through poverty. When he reached London he was told a man could live on 150 dollars a year. He used to give his dinner for 38 cents, a cut of meat for 12 cents, bread and cheese for 4 cents, while 2 cents were given as a tip to the girl who waited upon him.

Johnson was a truly religious man who believed that when he was poor and needy, the Lord thought upon him. God's presence was like a wall of fire through which the lions of poverty, disease and misfortune could not break. One had only to have a simple faith in God and a constant fear not in any slavish sense, but of a sort that would refrain him from doing wrong and not only would God's presence be a wall of fire round about, but the glory in the midst.

The choir, under the usual expert guidance of Professor Louis D. Thompson rendered a very fine anthem.

Mr. McConnell spent the afternoon in the Sunday School, taught the primary school an action chorus and addressed the whole school, using for illustrative purposes the red and white lambs of two girls.

At 7 o'clock, Mr. McConnell had his final opportunity of addressing the Zion congregation. His subject was the convenient season expected by Prince Felix to deal with his sins and to begin to live a new life.

"The apostle spoke of judgment just, and certain unto men as death, Prince Felix felt as if the thrust of deadly arrows obeyed his breath. 'I'll hear thee at convenient time.' He said, his terror to dissemble. But when can guilt conveniently Invite the truth that makes it tremble."

A mixed quartette rendered by Misses McLean and Mutch and Messrs. J. McLeod and McPherson, entitled "I am the way" was a pleasing feature, as also was the anthem, "Hear our Prayers."

Returns From Meeting

Expenditure in advertising represents only one percent of the amount left in Canada, and it is considered that the Dominion Government would be justified in spending a large yearly sum in advertising, but it would be extremely good business on their part. It is proposed to get data on the subject, prepare a brief and submit it to the Dominion Government for consideration.

The convention was a most successful one. There were representatives from every province in Canada, a number of whom represented provincial governments.

A representative from each of the departments of Natural Resources, and of Parks, Ottawa was also present. A splendid room was placed at the disposal of the association by the Provincial Government of Manitoba. Acting Premier Hon. Mr. Hoey and Mr. Clubb, Minister of Public Works and Roads attended several of the functions and a number of the meetings. There were four business meetings which occupied all of Monday and Tuesday of last week. The Marlborough and Fort Garry Hotels were the scenes of a number of luncheons and dinners given the delegates by the City of Winnipeg, the Winnipeg Tourist Bureau and the Canadian National Railroad and Canadian Pacific Railroad. Among the prominent speakers at those functions were Acting Premier Hoey, Hon. Mr. Clubb, Mr. Defoe, Editor of the Manitoba Free Press, Mayor Webb of Winnipeg, Mayor Wemp of Toronto and Messrs Warren and Neal of the C. N. R. Mayor Wemp represented the Toronto Tourist Bureau. Mr. Justice Arsenault speaks very highly of the treatment accorded the delegates on their trip.

"The immediate results from the convention of last year and this year lie in the contact established in the different provinces of Canada," Judge Arsenault believes. "There were present at the recent convention twenty five or thirty representatives of different provincial tourist bureaus which in the course of the year hand, led some millions of tourists. The friendly relations, thus established between the bureaus, will be productive of much good. The general policy of the Association is the making known of Canada at home and abroad. It is a well known fact that if a tourist is brought to any particular part of Canada, next year he is desirous of visiting some other part. It is the express intention of each bureau to encourage visitors to the different provinces of Canada. Each Bureau will keep on hand tourist literature and information from every province of Canada. An invaluable contact has been formed which is bound to result in increased tourist traffic. The interchange of ideas has been of great assistance. Questions puzzling some delegates have been solved by other delegates of greater experience."

"The transportation companies greatly appreciate the work being done by the Tourist Associations throughout Canada and are co-operating to the fullest extent."

"The agenda discussed was an extensive one, and occupied the attention of the delegates for the full time of both days. Although still in his infancy, the association has already accomplished a great deal of work, and the program for the future is most ambitious."

In addition to the board of directors, which is widely scattered, a central executive committee, composed of men who can easily get together, was appointed to meet periodically at Montreal or some central point.

Mr. Justice Arsenault will be an ex-officio member of the committee, and Mr. Theodore Morgan, Montreal, was appointed chairman.

On the invitation of the Provincial Government of Ontario and the City of Toronto the next annual meeting will be held in Toronto.

partially administer justice therein, so help you God.

"You shall well and truly execute the office and trust of Keeper of the Great Seal of His Majesty's Province of Prince Edward Island according to the best of your knowledge and ability, so help you God."

His Honour having sworn in the affirmative, he inscribed his name on the oath book after which he returned to the dais and took his seat on the Throne.

Receives Great Seal

was then placed in his hands by the Clerk of the Privy Council. The Provincial Secretary, Hon. Mr. Lea, then advanced to the Lieutenant Governor, who handed him the Great Seal, saying, "To your safe custody I commit the Seal of the Province of Prince Edward Island."

The Provincial Secretary returning to his place with the Great Seal, the Clerk of the Privy Council then handed the Lieutenant Governor his book of instructions, which the latter handed to his secretary.

The copy of the Holy Bible used in the proceedings was presented by the Clerk of the Privy Council to the Lieutenant Governor.

Immediately at the close of the proceedings an informal reception was held.

His Honour was presented by Dr. Leo Frank with a magnificent floral horseshoe, brought in by two Boy Scouts. The presentation being made by Mrs. J. D. Stewart. The flowers of the tribute were sent to the Charlottetown Hospital and to the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

In addition to the Governor's Aides, the following officers were present: Lieut. Col. P. W. McNevin, D.C.M., Major B. Conrad, M.M.

Fitting Recognition

The appointment of Hon. Charles Dalton as Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island marks a fitting recognition of a fine record of achievement and public service.

Born at Tignish in 1850, His Honour enters upon his new and responsible duties in his eightieth year, vigorous in body and of alert and active mind. Educated at the primary schools of Tignish—an education enhanced and ripened by judicious reading and extensive travel in later years—the then-unknown Charles Dalton turned his attention to farming. A keen hunter and sportsman, the lure of the wilds became an obsession and in the capture of his first silver fox he conceived the great idea which opened up a new world-industry and made the name of Dalton famous throughout the world.

Leaving the farm to enter the mercantile business, as well as to further develop the fox-breeding industry, his efforts met with marvelous success, and in 1912 upon retiring from the mercantile business and selling out his famous strain of Dalton foxes, he had already, through his own initiative and wide vision, amassed a considerable fortune. Unlike the many, whose newfound wealth finds expression either

in a thirst for power or greed for more gain, His Honour continued to lead the simple life, distributing his surplus wealth in various causes for the advancement of human welfare.

The Dalton Sanatorium, Dalton Hall at St. Dunstan's University, and the new Dalton School in course of construction at Tignish, aggregating a total of over \$150,000.00 in donations are samples of his generosity, whilst his contributions to the Allied cause in the world war, including a donation of a Red Cross ambulance, and the offer to supply a second one on condition that he might enlist and drive it, furnish striking proof of his patriotism and unswerving loyalty.

Elected to the Legislative Assembly in 1912, and again in 1916, His Honour served with distinction and occupied a seat in the Executive Council for the eight years of his tenure. In recognition of his fine record of public service and notable contributions to the cause of education, he received the honour of knighthood from Pope Benedict XV in 1915.

The Guardian joins with His Honour's host of friends in extending congratulations. That he will do credit to the exalted position he is called upon to occupy and add further lustre to a famous name need not the gift of a prophet to foretell
