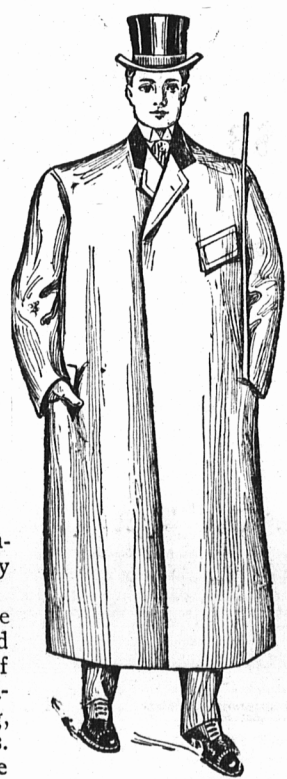

**INDEMNITY AND FARMS.**

According to the Canadian Year Book for 1904 the value of the average farm in Prince Edward Island with the buildings, implements and live stock is \$2,315 and the average production yearly of each farm \$561. Farming is the principal occupation of our people, and as we have few other industries farming is by far the largest wealth producing industry we have. Preachers, teachers, judges, lawyers, doctors, all very necessary to the welfare of the community, yet produce no wealth, but must be supported by the wealth producers.

This brings us to the matter of the indemnity which our Representatives and Senators have voted into their own pockets, and which the people have to pay. We have four Senators and four Members of the Commons on the list, or eight in all, to whom we are compelled to pay \$2,500 each yearly, or a total of \$20,000 a year. It is but rational that our farmers should each have a little plain talk with himself about the relations between the farm and this indemnity.

A farm represents the labor of a lifetime for a man and his wife. The Member or Senator votes himself yearly something more than the value of the average Island farm. In the five years term the Member

will receive the value of more than five farms. The Senator, more fortunate in a life appointment, may retain his position for thirty years and in that time be rewarded with the value of thirty-two farms. Our eight Senators and Members exact \$100,000 from us in each five years term, the equivalent of forty-two farms, with all the buildings, live stock and implements.

Or, let us take the annual production of the farms instead of their annual value. It takes pretty nearly the entire production of five farms to pay the indemnity of one Member or Senator for the year. In the five years term our eight representatives at Ottawa appropriate to themselves the equivalent of one year's production of one hundred and seventy-seven farms. There is a lot of care, labor and perspiration expended in a year upon a farm by the farmer, his wife, sons, daughters and hired help, and yet almost the entire production of five farms goes to reward the Senator or Member for his services at Ottawa during a part of the year.

The intelligent farmer will no doubt recall the fact that before our Members and Senators went to Ottawa last winter their pay had been settled at \$1500 each, or, say, for easy reckoning, about what three farms would produce in a year. The Members and Senators put their heads together and quietly agreed to pay themselves each the equivalent of what five farms would produce instead of what three farms would produce. They did this without consulting with, or giving notice to the people who pay them. They simply took the money, and that is how it comes about that it costs more than a farm yearly to send a Member or a Senator to Ottawa. Think it over farmers.

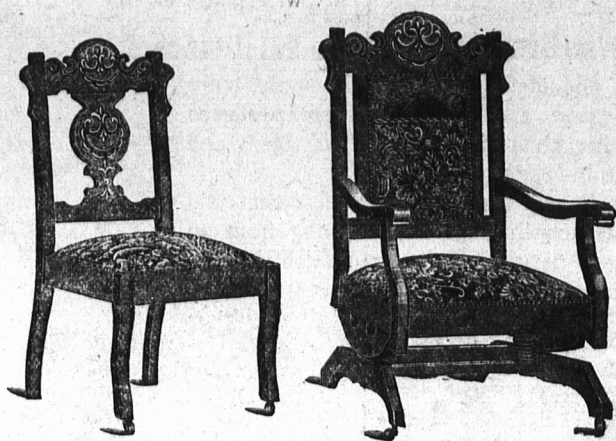

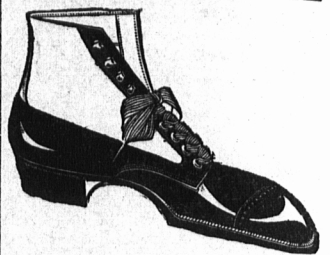
