NOTED LONDON SCULPTOR PUTS ARTIFICIAL NOSES ON WOUNDED SOLDIERS' FACES.


LONDON, February 26.—Derwent Wood, the distinguished British sculptor, who executed the famous bust of Washington, and enlisted as a private in the Army Medical Corps at the beginning of the war, is now turning his talent to a unique use.

All his leisure time is at present employed in replacing the parts of men's faces destroyed by wounds in battle. These include mouths, jaws, and even eyelids, all of which he has made to move naturally. He has just finished making a nose for a soldier, whose was blown away below the bridge. His addition, which he prepared of electrically-treated metal, is so perfect that where it is joined, it is absolutely imperceptible and the patient has regained his sense of smelling.

Wood is now given up most of his time to this work, and is able to treat cases daily. Surgeons who never thought that a sculptor's art could be adapted to this sort of work, are absolutely amazed at the remarkable results Wood has accomplished.

### BOYS IN TRENCHES INTERESTED IN HIGHLAND REGIMENT

Mr. W. A. Chandler of Mt. Albion has received the following letter from his son:

Belgium, Jan. 12, 1916

R. H. of C.

Dear Father—I received your very welcome letter a few days ago and was glad to hear from you, and to know that you are well, but sorry I have not had the time to answer before. Well, father, this is my birthday and I am 19 years of age, quite a little time since I left home as I was only 17 at that time old enough to enlist, but I am a little over enlisting age now.

I am in the trenches today and I am celebrating the day by sending a few lines of 303 over to German lines, and as our chaplain says I hope I am sending some one home to glory. One of our snipers picked off five Huns this morning just after daylight. There is a whole lot which I could tell you but it might not pass the censor. I may say though that there has been a great change out here since when I landed on the field first and that was Feb. 15th, 1915.

Things seem to be more in our favour every day and our infantry is steeper than the enemy, and as far as the artillery is concerned we send over five shells to their one.

It was only the other day when I was speaking to an officer of my old regiment, the 13th R. I. of C. that he said they have not lost a man for a month and they are in the trenches most all the time. Tell me the name of the Highland Regt. they are forming on the Island. They should be the Black Watch for a good thing or Seaforth or Gordon would do.

I received my Christmas parcel. It was all right.

France, January 30th, 1916

Dear Mother—Yesterday I received the Christmas box, in first class condition. Everything is fine except the oranges. My hat we like a fine feed. Cpl. McLeod, of Wolfville and I had a jolly time last evening, and tonight we are having another feed. The cake is excellent. I gave one cake to the Sergeants' Mess and they all passed complimentary remarks on it.

We are in a fine place now. The best situation we have had since enlisting. It is fine to get with our own Canadian troops again. Last evening one of my Acadia classmates came down to see us. Several of the boys are around here, besides we have nine here.

I am anxiously awaiting news from home. None has come since Dec. 29th. Some delay I think. There isn't any mail coming for the boys lately, but expect some soon. I am going for a walk some afternoon soon and shall go into Belgium to see some of the Acadia boys who are quite near here. The weather here is fine now; the grass is getting green, and the trees budding forth. The farmers are busy ploughing and cultivating; quite different from home.

I am real weaned and in good spirits, should like to be home of course, but must make myself at home here until I do get back.

Hoping you and all the dear ones at home are well. Will close by sending love to all.

### PEACE OR MORE FRIGHTFULNESS

BERLIN, Feb. 26.—Maximilien Harden, in an extraordinary article in his paper Die Zukunft, depicts Germany as unwilling to be compelled to lay waste fresh areas of the world and redouble her triumph of death, but as longer able to content with an interminable defensive. The article is translated from the German by the London Times as follows:

Six months ago the Germans could be content with defence, holding and using what they had conquered. Now it is too late.

Can we wait until the enemy has spied out every feature of our military system and war economies and there creeps upon us a state of want

which at present is falsely reported? A third harvest would be more difficult than the second. It would be difficult to make good our supplies, not of men, but of expenditure of materials, and our expenditure would increase immoderately. After three years of blockade others would occupy these places in the markets from which it seemed impossible that German trade should be expelled. Dare we wait? No! There is still a short space of time during which Germany might come to terms. Without loss of honor her enemies might make a decent and enduring peace, which would not bar the way to gradual reconciliation and European harmony.

These peace offers, it is suggested, might include a little disarmament, a little international socialism and a proposal to pool war expenses. If these proposals are refused Germany will have paid the last debt she owed to the world and humanity, and can proceed to be more frightful than ever with complete indifference to the views of neutrals, especially the United States.

We do not want to be caught in the pincers between a miserable peace and exhaustion by a long war, with the consolation that a long war will devastate the world, enemies as well as friends. We will not wait upon your pleasure.

If there must be death, we will determine the hour. No neutral state could expect us to think of its advantage or comfort rather than the security of our own life.

We are not tired, not afraid, and nineteen months of war have not paled our resolution. A worthy and moderate peace would be welcome; but the enfeebling of the Germans' power to strike, never!

THE POPE REGRETS THE AEROPLANE RAID.

ROME, February 25.—Cardinal Gasparri, the papal secretary of state, in a letter on behalf of Pope Benedict to the Archbishop of Ravenna, expresses the pope's "bitter sorrow and profound regret" for the families of the victims of the Austrian aeroplane raid of Ravenna, and neighboring towns on February 12, which is reported to have resulted in the death of twelve persons and the wounding of a number of others.
