Street Traders Form Union

LONDON, May 1 — (Reuters) — London's "barrow boys" — street trading outposts of private enterprise — have formed a trade union.

Seventy of them, meeting in a West End inn, made plans to fight local councils which refuse to grant them the licences without which they can not legally sell their varied wares. Only those who have traded for at least 10 years can join the union. The Westminster and Marylebone Traders Association.

Their first step was to establish a fighting fund to meet summonses for obstruction. Frank Scotty Fullen, 66, oldest "barrow boy" at the meeting, said he had traded in London for 47 years, had 3,001 convictions for obstruction and had paid £4,000 (\$16,000) in fines.

"People coming out of the forces are taking our livelihood away from us," Fullen complained. "There's a great difference between street traders and spivs, 'get rich quick' and 'easy money' operators."

He has a rooted dislike for policemen. He claims they have chased him for 50 years, and usually caught him. But, he says, he has served the Duke of Windsor and the Duchess of Kent in his time.

Altogether the "barrow boys" are having a rough time one way and another. Not only is the "spiv" or "wideboy" blackening their reputation by cashing in on post-war shortages, but the shopkeeper, often finding their cheaper prices too competitive, is out to deprive them of their livelihood.

No War Now, Soviet Papers Are Predicting

Soviet-controlled newspapers in Moscow and Berlin are predicting that there will be no war now.

"This should not engender feelings of complacency among the armed forces," adds the Soviet Army paper Red Star.

"There will be a political reckoning," says the fifth column editors in Berlin.

Which, combined, says Russia will continue to back political pressures with military power to promote her campaign of conquest through world revolution.

This is something for the United States to bear in mind as signs appear that the defensive steps she is taking may stave off a third world war.

The Communists in Moscow obviously will not deliberately provoke a war as long as expansion is still possible by other means. They may be working on the theory that all they need to do is to keep the United States afraid of war. By that they force the United States
