**CAKE TALK**  
Frances Reiton



Why do some women get results in their cake baking that make them the envy of their friends? What is the little extra touch that makes one woman's baking more successful than her neighbour's? Well — I have discovered that, what helps women most in achieving baking success is following a tested recipe exactly.

You know — it's remarkable how often a good cook fails to stick exactly to her instructions. I once gave a cake recipe to some thirty good cooks, and watched them carefully as they followed it. I was surprised at how many slipped up on one or another little short of the melting, delicious goodness they could have achieved.

Cake making is really so easy, if you follow the directions. First of all, read your recipe through to the end. Bring together all the ingredients required for your cake, and measure them carefully (all measurements level, of course!). Then check your measurements, and re-read the method, before you start mixing your cake. Be sure to use the size of pans specified by your recipe. If you haven't the size of pan indicated, a good rule to follow with most batters, is to half-fill the pans.

And now — here's a recipe I'm sure you'll like

**RED DEVIL'S FOOD**

4 squares Baker's Unsweetened Chocolate	1 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cup hot water	1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup sugar	1 1/4 cups sugar
2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour	3 eggs
1 teaspoon baking soda	1/2 cup milk
	1 teaspoon vanilla

Place chocolate and water in double boiler. Stir over boiling water until chocolate melts and mixture thickens. Add 1/2 cup sugar; stir and cook 2 minutes. Cool to lukewarm. Sift flour once, measure, add soda and salt; sift three times. Cream shortening, add 1/4 cup sugar gradually; cream until light. Add eggs, one at a time; beat well after each. Add flour alternately, in small amounts; beat smooth after each addition. Add vanilla and chocolate mixture; blend. Bake in 2 deep 9-inch layer pans that have been lined on bottoms with paper, ten grams. Use moderate oven (350° F.) about 30 minutes.
