He is a graduate of McGill College, a lecturer in physiology in that university, and enjoys a good practice in the city of Montreal. The bride was given away by her brother, W. H. Curry, and wore a handsome gown of cream silk colporteur with yoke and panels of point lace over cream tulle and silk. The bridal veil was artistically draped and kept in place with orange blossoms. Both bride and groom were unattended. The ceremony was performed by the groom's father and a full choir was present.

Hogan for spruce stakes; Barra for plank, to be used in connection with street work. It was resolved that the services of A. E. Leigh, as City Electrician be dispensed with after March 1st. On motion it was decided that the old property on P's more St. 1, formerly used as a cattle pound be disposed of.
