The other prices were unchanged.

INTERESTING TRIP.—Mrs. M. G. Mosher has arrived home after being South for several months. She joined her husband at St. John New Brunswick last Jan. The first of their voyage they experienced very bad weather. A tremendous gale blew their schooner hundreds of miles out of her course, she being only in ballast, but being a good sea boat, they arrived at Passangoula, Mississippi, where she took in a cargo for Port De France, Martinique, passing near St. Pierre, the island that was destroyed by Mt. Pelee in 1902. It has a few small bays there now, a very poor attempt at building it up again. They also called to Havana Cuba. Havana is unsurpassed for its beautiful parks and promenades. Hundreds of people are to be seen there every night enjoying the cool breeze among the beautiful palm trees. The parks are all illuminated and two bands are kept playing to add to the amusements. SUPERVISED PLAYGROUND.—Following up the lecture and stereopticon entertainment given last Tuesday evening by Mr. Reilly, Secretary of the Y. M. C. A., the Guardian is pleased to announce a tangible continuance. On Monday next a supervised playground will be opened on the Prince Street School grounds for the benefit of little ones in the vicinity. The grounds will be provided with sand boxes, clay for modelling, facilities for paper-cutting, swings, tether ball, and a large number of playground games. The grounds will be under the direction of Miss Adele Palmer, a trained Kindergarten teacher and who is making a special study of education by plays and games. The grounds will be for the free use of all the children in the section of the city surrounding the Prince Street School, between the ages of three and ten years and for girls over ten. Boys over ten are expected to go to Victoria Park where provision is made for their play life. The move is a splendid one and should receive the fullest possible encouragement from citizens. This is but a beginning and if the sanguine hopes of its promoters are realized a healthier moral tone will ere long pervade the young life of the city and remove much of the present cause of complaint about youthful delinquents.
