FINES IMPOSED UNDER GAME ACT—On Thursday at Souris three Game Act cases were disposed of. A gunner from Joseph W. MacDonald, charged with having muskrats in possession in close season a Fortune resident was fined \$20.00 and costs of 20 days. A gunner from Peakes was fined \$10.00 and costs of 10 days for hunting Ruffed Grouse (native partridge) with a 22 cal rifle and the rifle ordered confiscated. A third party was fined \$10.00 and costs of 10 days for shooting partridge from a car. The prosecutions were conducted by the R. C. M. P.

CONVICTIONS UNDER MIGRATORY BIRDS ACT—Over the weekend a gunner appeared before S-Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald at Souris charged with shooting on Black Pond Sanctuary and was fined \$10.00 and costs of 30 days in jail. Earlier in the week a Summerside resident was convicted when he appeared before S-Magistrate R. S. Hinton at Summerside charged with two separate offences under the M.B.C. Act, hunting migratory birds by the use of a power boat and using a rifle to hunt ducks. He was fined \$10.00 and costs of 30 days in jail on each charge and a 30-40 high powered Winchester rifle was ordered confiscated. The prosecutions were conducted by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

MOSCOW, Oct. 23—A hitch has developed in U. S. plans to be host to a world telecommunications conference next year, and the question of a conference site will be checked to the United Nations Economic and Social Council.

The U. S. delegation, which thought it had a clear field, found the invitation opposed by Britain and France, both of which wanted a European site. The conference will have a major role in the world-wide use of radio, telephone, telegraph and war-developed inventions such as radar.

Russia and China took no active part in discussion of the site during the three-week preliminary conference now drawing to a close here.

The Kirk Pulpit

The guest speaker at The Kirk yesterday was the Rev. Dr. W. A. Cameron, Secretary of The General Board of Missions of The Presbyterian Church in Canada; the sermon in the Evening was delivered by the Minister, the Rev. T. H. B. Somers who said: This leads me to say a word in passing about the greatest intellectual sin in Christ's eyes. What feature in the mind of the mental life was darkest and most guilty to our Lord? Was it ignorance? Think of Him on the cross, crying "Father, forgive them they know not what they do." Was it doubt? Think of Him with Thomas: "Thomas, reach thy hand and feel the wound-print!" Christ was not harsh and terrible with doubters. Christ had an infinto pity for the ignorant. It was not to be ignorant that damned a man. What damned him was to be unteachable. "Except ye become as little children, ye cannot enter the kingdom of God." The one condition of entrance to the best was to be childlike, teachable, receptive. And so conversely to be fixed and final—to have every window closed and gateway barred, was the one way to lose the breath of heaven, and to miss the gentle foothold of the angels. It is not doubt that is faith's opposite. Doubt sometimes is but faith disguised. The opposite of faith is that finality which does not believe in larger truth tomorrow. Faith throws the door open for new messengers across the hills. Faith is expectant, eager, childlike buoyant. Its opposite is not doubt, but death.

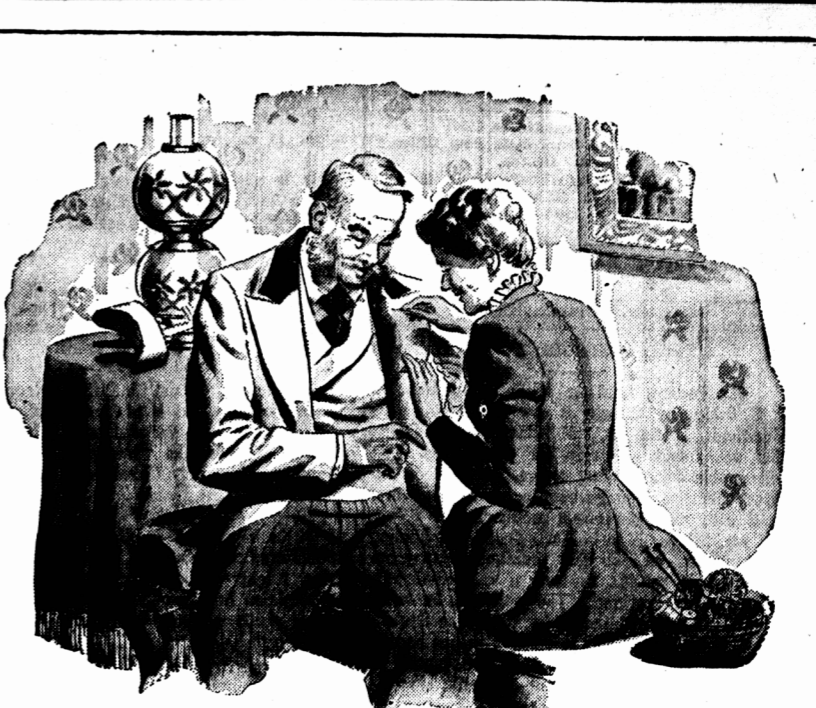
