OBITUARY.—Passed away peacefully at his home Point Pleasant, Lot 63 on July 26th, ult, after a long and painful illness, borne in a truly Christian spirit, Angus McLean in the 77th year of his age, leaving a sorrowing widow and a family of five sons and six daughters, located in different parts of Canada and the United States, to mourn the loss of a devoted husband and affectionate father, also a very numerous circle of relatives and friends to whom he was always dearly beloved. 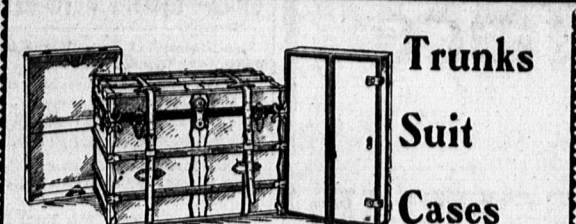

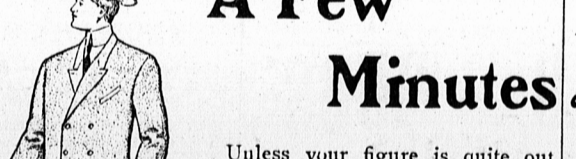
