Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duration—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

MILITARY DEFEAT ALONE WILL BRING ABOUT COLLAPSE

London Time Says Decisive Defeat is Only Way to Secure a Lasting Peace—Hun Food Supplies Are Falling.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—The economic pressure we would bring to bear would be sufficient to bring the enemy to his knees in time, yet too much should not be expected in that direction.

"Military defeat alone will bring about the collapse of the central powers, and with that collapse, lasting peace."

So says the London Times, adding: "Further evidence has been obtained by an authoritative observer as to the food supplies of the central powers. It tends to the conclusion that the coming harvest will not carry them far into next spring and that the critical period from the present time until the harvest is reaped will produce much suffering."

Civilians Need Food. "There are indications that the children of the poor in the large towns are going hungry, their diet consisting of potatoes and containing very little sugar. It is known that the diplomats in Berlin are receiving food from foreign countries. It is certain that the soldiers at the front are being fed, for the most part, at the expense of the civil population, but it appears some of the soldiers are put on shorter rations than those about to make an attack, may have full rations."

Help from Rumania. "The blockade which has increased constantly in stringency, together with the reduction of supplies from neutral powers, has had effect and was it not for the supplies which the central powers have obtained from Rumania their stocks of food would have come to an end."
