## 10th Annual W. I. Convention

The tenth Annual District Convention of the Women's Institutes of McDonald, Mt. Allison, Fownal, Alexandra, Hazelbrook, Mt. Herbert and Waterville met in the Protestant Orphanage July 19th at 2.30 p.m., the President Mrs. Harold Carver occupied the chair. The address of welcome by Mrs. Earl Ings was responded to by Mrs. Harold Smith. Meeting opened with the Institute Ode followed by the reading of the minutes of the last convention were read and approved.

The Roll Call of the Institutes resulted as follows: McDonald 10; Mt. Allison 5; Fownal-Alexandra 5; Hazelbrook 9; Mt. Herbert 5; also a large number of visitors.

The following reports from the different institutes were very interesting and encouraging in that the programmes are centered more on educational bases.

A nominating committee of three members was appointed. Mrs. Hope Mutch, Mrs. Harold Smith and Mrs. W. T. Coady. The President welcomed our new Institutes Fownal-Alexandra, Miss Rena Wood and her pupils then delighted the audience with folk-dancing and songs, followed by an address and demonstration on weaving by our Assistant Supervisor Miss Hazard.

Recommendation in using Farm Products came from the A.C.W.W. which met in Washington. The sense of beauty has been lost to a large extent, and life is poorer for it. Man cannot live by bread alone. Without recognition of that beauty there can be no true man or woman.

Miss Hazard also gave some interesting suggestions in Hooking, Quilting, etc.

Mrs. Gray Judson gave a very interesting demonstration on nursing in First-aid treatment of different injuries etc.

A very profitable paper was read and prepared by Mrs. Earl Ings on special classes for sub-normal children in the Public Schools. A fundamental fact in this, is that these children learn by the objective experiences in life in that they learn slowly and need much individual training. They have a right to receive an education suited to their requirement, which will enable a great number to live happily and become useful self-supporting citizens.
