Japanese Prisoners

The High Commissioner for the United Kingdom recommends that British subjects whose home ties are with the United Kingdom and who were evacuated to Canada from the Far East on account of or in anticipation of Japanese hostilities, particularly wives and dependents of United Kingdom prisoners of war and internees who have been in Japanese hands, should register their names and addresses with the Office of the United Kingdom Ministry of War Transport. The registration of names in order that information may be communicated to them regarding their return to the United Kingdom. It is contemplated that United Kingdom prisoners of war and internees who have been in Japanese hands will on their liberation be brought to the United Kingdom (except in the case of those domiciled elsewhere). Reunion with their families on their arrival in the United Kingdom is regarded as likely to make a major contribution to the restoration of their health. Wives and families of United Kingdom prisoners and internees are advised to prepare to return to the United Kingdom in due course in order to meet their husbands on their return. The cost of passages to the United Kingdom (or to other country with which home ties are closer) is payable from Government funds in the case of persons who came to Canada on evacuation from Far Eastern colonial territories and foreign countries which have been occupied by the Japanese.

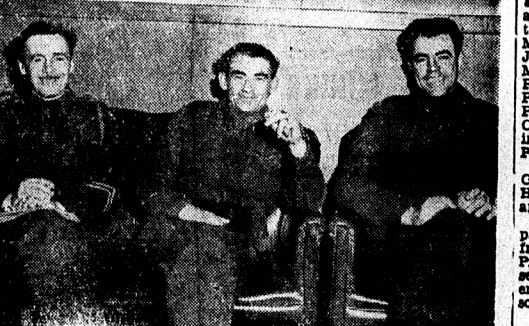

HOME NURSE

"I never could read a thermometer," wailed a forlorn little mother who had suddenly become a home nurse by compulsion.

This is something every person should know, and it doesn't require intellectual genius to learn. If you don't know how to read a thermometer, suppose you get one and you will find that the thermometer is a hollow glass tube, at one end of which is a bulb containing mercury. The heat of the body makes the mercury rise in the tube. The point at which it stops indicates the body temperature.

The normal body temperature is approximately 98.6 degrees. This point is marked on the thermometer by an arrow. When the mercury rises above this point, the patient has a fever.

Shake Well

On the stem of the thermometer is a graduated scale numbered from 92 to 104 or 110. Each long black mark represents a degree. There are four short marks between the long ones. Each of these represents two-tenths of a degree. Thus, if the mercury stops at the second short mark above the 100 degree line, we say the patient has a temperature of 100.4 degrees. You will find that the thermometer is slightly triangular in shape. Hold it up on a level with your eye, looking at the triangular edge; then roll it slightly between your fingers until you see the silver streak of mercury and note exactly where it ends.

MR. ALPHONNUS MALONE

The people of Shamrock, P. E. I., and the outlying districts were deeply grieved to hear of the death of Alphonnus Malone at his home on February 12th. As the curtains of night were being drawn and the light of a new day was dawning the soul of the deceased passed into the Presence of its Creator to meet the sentence of a Just Judge and to see Light Eternal.

Mr. Malone was in robust health for some time previous to his death and his untimely passing and keen determination urged him not to give up. However, as time went on it became apparent that God would otherwise and in spite of medical skill and all the tender care that loving hands could bestow on him on the above mentioned date he calmly breathed his last fortified by the last consoling rites of the Catholic Church administered to him by his kind pastor, Rt. Rev. J. A. Murphy, D. D.

He was born in Kelly's Cross, Lond., sixty-one years ago. He attended the district school but like many other Island sons while in the Province had he left his native Province to seek a livelihood in the United States. Here he met and married his surviving wife the former Sarah A. Creighton. They then took up residence in the city of Haverhill, Mass., where Mr. Malone became manager of the Marsden Express Co. In the years that followed many a toil weary islander found a haven of comfort and rest within the hospitable Malone home.

His love for his native soil prompted him to return to his birthplace. In nineteen twenty-seven with his wife and only child, Mary, he settled on the County Line Road, where he engaged in farming. The industry he followed until the time of his death.

His funeral took place at St. Malachy's Church, Kinkora, on Thursday morning, February fifteenth and the large procession of sorrowing neighbors and friends which followed this remains to their last resting place bore testimony of the esteem in which Alphonnus was held. Requiem Mass was celebrated by the pastor Rev. Magr. Jas. Murphy.

Besides his sorrowing wife and daughter Mary (Mrs. Emmett McQuaid) Southville, P. E. I., he leaves to mourn four grand children, namely: Eleanor, Eleanor and Ralph McQuaid on whom he bestowed the love and tender care of a father, also eight brothers and three sisters namely: John Taiton, Mass.; Joseph, Dorchester, Mass.; James and Patrick, Haverhill, Mass.; Elisha, Lowell, P. E. I.; Philip and Thomas, Charlottetown, P. E. I.; Anthony in Kinkora, Mrs. Greenan (Margaret) Kelly's Cross, Mrs. John Whelan (Catherine) Haverhill, Mass.; Rita, Morell, P. E. I.
