United Farmers Hold Meeting In Bedeque

A very large and enthusiastic meeting of the United Farmers of P. E. Island was held in the Central Bedeque hall on the evening of Dec. 10. After a few remarks pertaining to the U. F. Movement by the President, Horace Wright, he introduced the speaker of the evening, Mr. J. A. Dewar M. P. P.

Mr. Dewar's address was principally along the lines of co-operation, but he touched on the political side as well. He very ably replied to the criticisms of Mr. Kelly, Graham's Road, regarding his attitude on certain bills passed in the last session of the legislature and clearly outlined his attitude in connection with the Highway Bill, Veterinary Act, etc. Referring to the increases in taxes, Mr. Dewar said that he was in favor of an increase for the purpose of increasing the salaries of the school teachers of the province, but that such acts as the increasing of the salaries of the members of the legislature at a time when such strict economy was necessary, he said had no sympathy.

In closing Mr. Dewar made a strong plea for closer co-operation among the farmers of this province. The meeting was then thrown open for discussion, a goodly number taking part. A question was asked Mr. Dewar by Mr. J. J. Frizle, as to whether there is any way of getting rid of the present government (and their enormous taxes) other than giving them from the House of Parliament with rifles. He replied that there is no constitutional way excepting the dissolving of the house by the lieutenant-governor, and it is only in extremely rare cases that this course is taken by that official.

Another speaker was Mr. David Schurman who, while not at present engaged in agriculture, said he is heartily in sympathy with the United Farmers' movement. He said he was very active in the former organization at the time the "Patrons of Industry" was formed but, owing to the fact that the country was not ready at that time for such a reform it was condemned to failure. However, he believed the sentiment of the country has changed since that time and he thought the U. F. a move in the right direction. MacFarlane Alev MacFarlane, T. J. A unanimous vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Dewar by the meeting for his kindness in coming to Bedeque and giving such a splendid speech in the interests of the United Farmers' Movement.

TO PLACE U. S. DIPLOMATIC SERVICE UNDER GREAT SOCIAL HANDICAP

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12—Ambassadors and other American diplomatic representative in foreign countries are prohibited from even attending a function where liquors are served under the terms of a bill introduced in the House of Representatives by Representative Upshaw, Democrat, of Georgia, today.

The Volstead law applicable to all American citizens abroad, and carried a section specifically applying to diplomatic officers. Mr. Upshaw says it is endorsed by the Anti-Saloon League, the International Reform Bureau, and World Anti-Alcoholic Congress, and every other temperance organization in America.

"These forces," he continued, "intend to see that citizens of the United States do not debase the want to be free. There has been an exodus of brewers, distillers, and saloon-keepers from this country to other lands since national prohibition became effective here. The Chinese in particular have protested against their operations there. Legislation of this character has been strongly urged by that nation. It applies, however, to all countries where there are no treaty conflicts."

A large number of Chinese stu-

dents attending colleges and universities in this country will attend the hearings on the bill and make appeals for its passage, Mr. Upshaw added.

Heavy penalties are provided for violation, and enforcement of the Act is vested in Consular and judicial officers in foreign countries.
