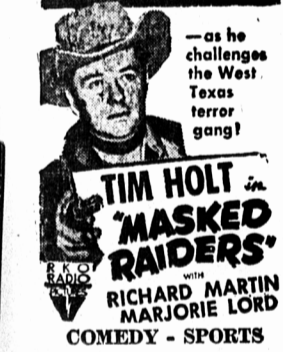

The writer came across the following sailing schedule of the steamer Electra in an issue of "The Weekly Examiner", Charlottetown, dated September 5th, 1902. This should be of interest to many of our older residents, who recall the Electra. "The steamer Electra will run as follows: Monday, leaves Georgetown for Montague at 6 a.m. and Montague for Lower Montague, Georgetown, Beach Point and Picton same day; Tuesday, returns from Picton to Georgetown and Montague; Wednesday, leaves Montague in the morning at 5 a.m., calling at Murray Harbour and thence to Charlottetown; Thursday, leaves Charlottetown at noon for Georgetown, calling at Beach Point; Friday, Georgetown to Montague, thence to Picton, calling at Murray Harbour; Saturday, Picton to Georgetown, calling at Murray Harbour; Saturday, Picton to Georgetown, calling at Murray Harbour." Also in the August 22nd issue of 1902 the following item appeared. "A brigantine of 240 tons was launched from the shipyard of Hon. Daniel Gordon, Georgetown, this morning." Lang Sme brought the program to a close.

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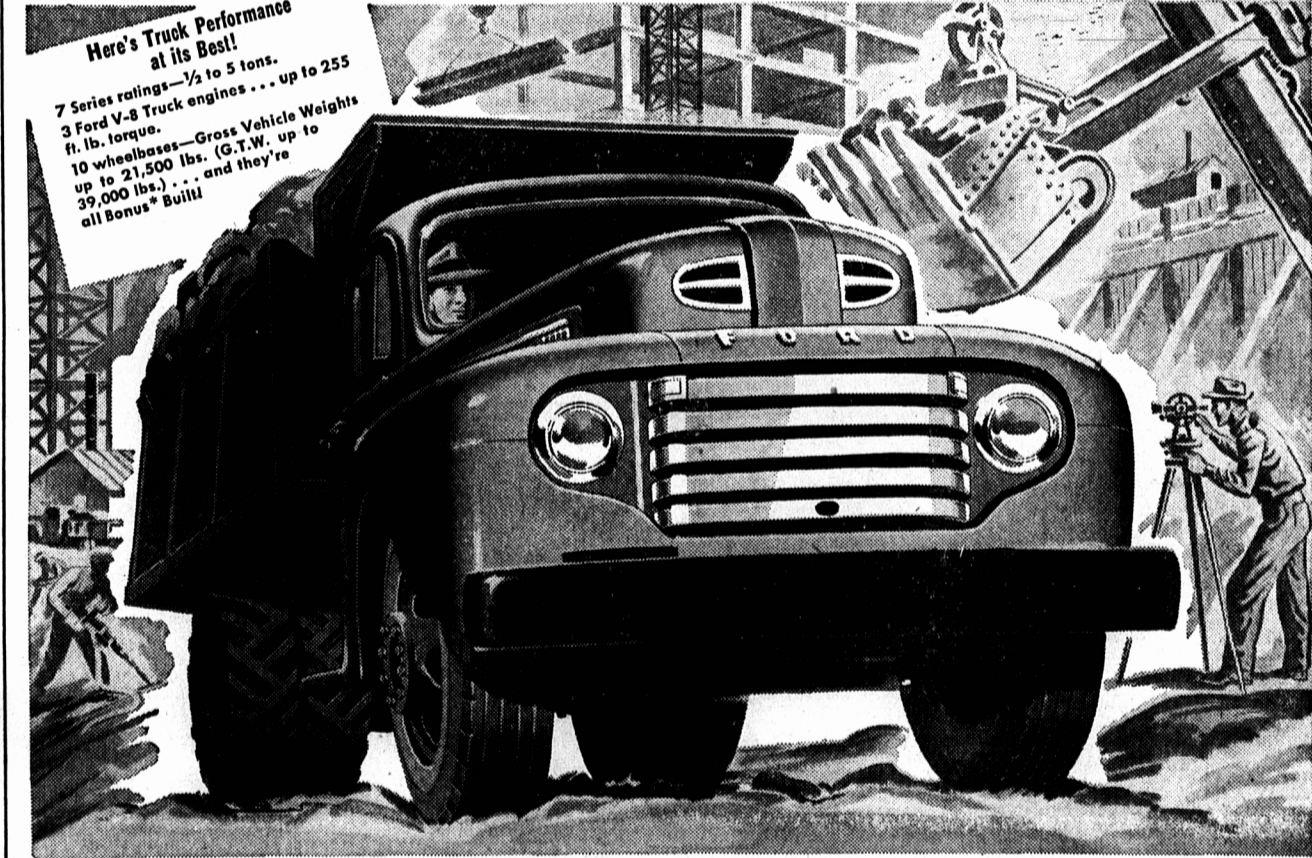
