

Tommy Cotter Goes To Sydney

FREDERICTON, Feb. 16.—Tommy Cotter, 2.14, one of the veterans of the harness racing turf in the Maritime Provinces, and formerly owned in St. John has been sold by H. G. Kitchin, of this city, to Bert Doyle, of Sydney, N.S. Tommy Cotter took his win race in 1917 and since then has not raced to it, which would give him the full six seconds advantage this year and allow him to start in events for 2.21 paces. Tommy Cotter is a bay gelding by Brazilian, and when he got his mark was one of the fastest paces bred in the Maritime Provinces. It is understood that his new owner plans to use Tommy Cotter on the ice this winter and will later campaign him on the Cape Breton circuit next summer.

HALIFAX, Feb. 16.—A communication received by President J. J. Condon of the New Arena, announces that Manager George Kennedy of the Canadiens hockey team of the National Hockey League, would play in Amherst and Moncton next week and seek dates in Halifax. Condon says that he will arrange games for the flying Frenchmen and will select an all-star team from maritime players. Bill Stewart will be brought from Toronto; Lee Lowther, Amherst, and the two Corroll boys of Moncton, along with Chester Gregory, will line up the down centers. A good goaler will be secured from one of the maritime clubs with a possibility of Rogers of the Moncton team getting the job. Eddie McPherson, Frank Condon, Neil White and Chumrie Murray will represent Halifax. Moncton will be the first stop of the Canadiens and Amherst will be encountered the following day. February 25, will likely be the date of the opening game at Moncton.

Leaky Cylinders Make An Engine "Popless" And Prodigal ON EVERY ALTERNATE DOWNSTROKE of an engine piston a cylindrical of gasoline and air mixture is drawn in from the carburetor to form the charge that is to be squeezed into the small clearance space above the piston. The intake ascends on its succeeding upstroke—the compression stroke—and exploded by the spark at the beginning of the next downstroke—the power stroke. If the charge thus drawn in remains in the cylinder while these operations are going on, full power is obtained from the fuel supplied, but if any gas escapes from the cylinder before it has done its work, it is irrevocably lost and absolutely wasted—or worse than wasted. The prime condition of efficiency in a powerful engine operation is that the cylinder should be gas-tight and that no escape should occur from it from the time that its inlet-valve closes, after letting in the charge, until its exhaust-valve opens to let out the burned charge. If there is any leakage of gases from the cylinder during this period, it simply means that a portion of the fuel supplied has been thrown away into the water or the crankcase or a part of the pressure, that should have usefully pushed the piston, has escaped unprofitably. The ideal cylinder should absolutely confine its contents so long as its valves are closed and this is the sine-qua-non of satisfactory engine operation. A cylinder that is thus gas-tight is said to have perfect compression, because the charge confined in it during its compression stroke cannot leak out, even when its pressure is raised by the upward movement of the piston. This ideal condition of perfect gas-tightness of a cylinder is seldom if ever realized, but practical tightness can be attained and must be maintained, if high fuel economy and power are sought. Unfortunately the conditions of use are constantly tending against tightness and toward the development of gas leaks and the compression in a cylinder is always tending toward causing reduced efficiency and output, so that testing the compression becomes one of the most important acts in the determination of engine condition. This is a simple, quick and easy test and one that pays to make every 1,000 miles at least.

BIRCH HILLS CREAMERY SCORES DISTINCT TRIUMPH

P. E. Islander makes wonderful showing with his butter exhibition—Wins prizes from one end of Dominion to other—Barricaded on Feb. 11th. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. James McGrath, McNeil. (From The Birch Hill Gazette, Sask.) In dairying as in other lines exhibition work is especially valuable first from an educational, secondly from an advertising standpoint. During the year 1920 Mr. T. S. McGrath, manager of the Birch Hills branch of the Saskatchewan Co-operative Creameries, Limited, has scored a longer list of winnings than perhaps ever before secured by a Saskatchewan buttermaker in a single year. During the year he has won prizes at Charlottetown and Vancouver and at many of the larger exhibitions at intervening cities, including the Canadian National and Toronto, and the National Dairy Show, Chicago, which are the two great annual events of the kind on the continent. The following is a list of Mr. McGrath's winnings for the year 1920. Saskatchewan Dairy Convention Moose Jaw—First prize, De Laval; first prize for best winter butter in November and December; third prize for highest average score on all butter graded during 1919. Western Canada Dairy Convention, Winnipeg—First prize, De Laval interprovincial competition. Edmonton Summer Exhibition—Two first prizes and a gold medal for the highest average score on butter made in Saskatchewan. one, second one third and one seventh prize. Provincial Exhibition, Regina—One first one second and one third prize, grand championship and the Motherwell trophy for the highest total score in creamery butter classes. Vancouver Exhibition—Two 4th prizes. Ottawa Exhibition—Fifth prize. Charlottetown Exhibition, P. E. I.—2nd prize. National Dairy Show, Chicago—Silver medal awarded a 2nd prize in open class for creamery butter. Mr. McGrath also obtained a notable standing in this year's Dominion Education Butter scoring contest. Mr. McGrath's average on the six boxes was 96.18, and is the highest average score made by any individual creamery in the Dominion. It is of course impossible to estimate the value to the province or to the Co-operative Creameries which company Mr. McGrath more particularly represents, of the success of his performance. There is no question that his performance has not only made Mr. McGrath conspicuous in dairying circles, but has brought Birch Hills district, Saskatchewan butter and Saskatchewan creamery butter and Saskatchewan dairying generally most prominently to the attention of many interested persons in both eastern and western Canada as well as the states. Mr. McGrath is a native of Prince Edward Island and received an early and thorough training in the cheese and butter business. He came west in 1912 and worked at Winnipeg, Moose Jaw and Carleton Place, coming to Birch Hills in 1914. While Mr. McGrath's individuality, knowledge, skill, and perseverance are the real factors making for his success, it should not be overlooked that the co-operation of the patrons of Birch Hills Creamery was also an essential to his attainments, and it might have been more correct to have said that Mr. McGrath and the dairymen of Birch Hills won the prizes. The quality of the raw material, namely, the cream, is large determining factor in the quality of the butter. The pasturage for the cattle throughout the district is of such quality that prize-winning butter can be turned out from the rich cream. Well done, McGrath, you are helping to put Birch Hills on the map.

ANOTHER WIN FOR McGRATH The results of the highest average score competition have just been announced from the Dairy Branch of the Dept. of Agriculture. Prizes in this competition are awarded as the result of the entire season's butter grading work. The branch maintains butter grading depots at Regina and Saskatoon and samples from each churning made during the season are sent to these grading depots from all creameries in the province. Three years ago Gordon Ironside and Fares Packers, Ltd., offered a handsome silver trophy as an award to the buttermakers securing the highest score on all butter graded during the season. This trophy must be won twice by the same creamery before becoming permanent property of the winner. In 1918 it was won by the P. A. Creamery Co. in 1919 by the Shellbrook Creamery of which J. A. White is manager and by the 1920 results just announced it is awarded to the Birch Hills Creamery of which T. S. McGrath with a score of 95.23. Another feather in Birch Hills District cap and a host of congratulations for Mr. McGrath.

CAN EXPORT GOAL—The board of railway commissioners for Canada has rescinded the order prohibiting the exportation of coal from Atlantic, St. Lawrence and gulf ports of Canada, except to the United States or to Newfoundland.
