### JUST A BAD YEAR FOR THE SENATORS

Eddie Baker, Sports Editor of the Ottawa Citizen, has the following to say regarding Ottawa's position in the National League:

Whatever the reasons, some outside writers continue to publish stories to the effect that the Ottawa hockey team will be sold before next season, and this despite the fact that William Foran, President of the Ottawa club, has repeatedly stated there is no foundation for such reports.

A Boston Advertiser writer almost demands that the Ottawa franchise be transferred to that city. A considerable length he refers to the failure of hockey in Ottawa, which, of course, is so much hokey.

True, the Ottawa team is trailing in the Canadian section of the N.H.L. this season, but the Ottawa team is not a habitual trailer. Other N.H.L. teams, several others in fact, have had off seasons, and come back to be championship contenders. It is not so long since the Boston Bruins and Chicago Black Hawks were unable to get up into a contending position, and now they are leading the parades in the American group of the league.

Hockey is not a failure in Ottawa. On the contrary, all things considered, Ottawa is one of the best of hockey cities. This is appreciated by all other clubs in the National Hockey League as they are opposed to the local franchise being transferred to another city.

Because the Ottawa team is not setting or forcing the pace this season it does not follow that the same conditions would exist another season.

It's not so long since the Senators were the best drawing cards in the N.H.L. on the road, not excepting the speedy and popular Canadiens, and the league was composed then, as it is now, of ten clubs. No one has yet advanced a reason why the Ottawa team cannot regain the good form of other seasons.

## Reminiscence Of War Incident

TORONTO, Jan. 24.—Capt. T. W. Morse, of Port Credit, Ont., near here, war time aviator, and proprietor of the Oak Ridge Poultry Farm at Port Credit, recently returned from a European trip, in the course of which he visited the German officer who commanded the machine gun corps which shot down his aeroplane twenty miles behind the German lines during the latter part of the war. Behind the visit to the German officer, there lies a story. As a result of the crash, which took place on the Cambria front in November, 1917, Capt. Morse was seriously wounded, and held captive in of the war. Then from a photograph German prison camps until the end taken by the Germans at the time of the crash, and years later forwarded to Capt. Morse, a mutual acquaintance sprang up which resulted in the visit.

While flying near Valentia, Capt. Morse sighted German troops marching on the roadway below him; he swooped and raked them with machine gun fire. Again he swooped inflicting further damage. On the third dive the Germans established their machine guns in position and opened fire. One bullet tore through the Captain's face and another bullet killed the sergeant in the machine, which crashed 1,100 feet to the ground out of control. The Germans rushed up and found that there was life in the body of Morse. Meantime they had taken a photograph of the wreckage, showing it surrounded by Germans, and Morse still lying unconscious on the ground.

Years after the war, the German officer, Lehman, came across the photograph in his collection. He communicated with the British War Office and was given the name of the pilot through the number of the aeroplane.

## Probe Shipment Of Totem Poles


VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 24.—Acting on representations from Premier S. F. Tolmie of British Columbia the Dominion Government today ordered an investigation into the removal of a carload of totem poles shipped from Prince Rupert for a United States museum.

The care will not be allowed out of Canada pending the inquiry. The Premier, on being informed of this shipment, telegraphed, immediately to Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, protesting on the ground that the shipping of totem poles should be proscribed as far as possible.
