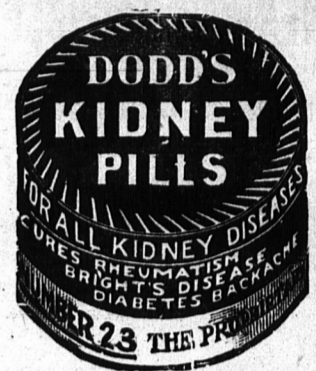

PANAMA CANAL WILL BE RE-OPENED SHORTLY

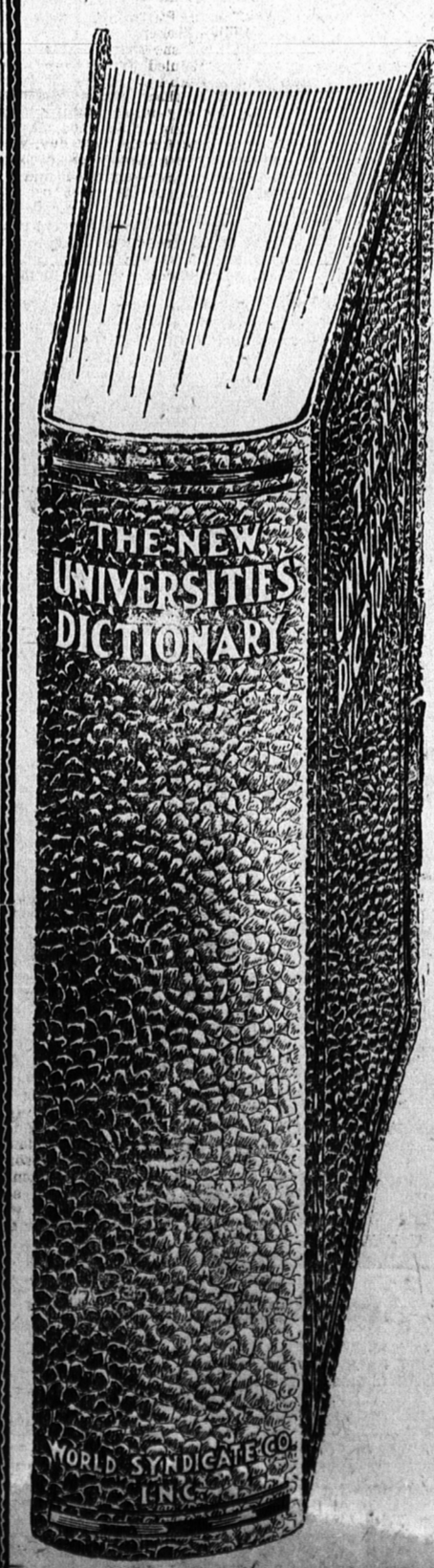
WASHINGTON, March 20.—The Panama Canal, which has been closed since September 18 last by one of the worst slides in its history, will be opened again for the passage of vessels of deep draft on April 15. This is the prediction of Col. Harding, acting governor of the Canal Zone, made in a cablegram to the War Department.

AMSTERDAM, March 20.—A semi-official statement issued in Berlin says:

"The withdrawal of Admiral Von Tirpitz from the naval ministry takes place with all honours. His resignation is generally regretted in view of his great services in making of the German fleet the highly valuable instrument which it has proved to be during the course of the war."
