Mission Work At Jobat, India

MONTREAL, Nov. 22—(C.P.)—An admitting officer in a Canadian hospital would be rather surprised if asked to house a whole family who had come along with a patient but it would cause no concern in a hospital in India. Miss Isabe McConnell, R. N., who is in charge of the nursing at the hospital connected with the Presbyterian Mission at Jobat, India, told a local gathering of how common this practice was among the Bhils, an aboriginal, pre-Aryan race, whom she has ministered to for nearly 5 years, and of the opportunities thus afforded the hospital staff to do missionary work. There were often enough of the patients' relatives to form an audience, she said. One woman patient, Mrs McConnell told of, had been accompanied by her husband, her mother, a brother-in-law and his wife, and several children, together with some sacks of grain, cooking utensils and a goat.

Among the non-Christians it is regarded as evil for a patient to die in a Christian hospital. Therefore, when such a person is nearing the end, Miss McConnell explained, he or she is taken away by relatives. A donation of \$1,500 Miss McConnell has received from a W. M. S. worker in Toronto with which to build a special ward in the hospital and \$300 with which to furnish it, would enable her, she said, to realize the hope she had entertained for two years of caring for the women of the bazaars, who would not come to the hospital because there were men there.

In some places the Bhils are known as professional plunderers but it is sheer necessity that drives them to it, said Miss McConnell. They are poor, living mostly in bamboo and mud huts, and often obliged to pay half their grain crop to the owner of the fields. Although the average pay for the ordinary laborer is 10 cents, and for women six cents a day, most of the Bhil Christians give a 10th of their earnings to the church, she said. As a result they built their own native church at Jobat which was dedicated in July of this year. They provide for their own native minister who is in charge.

It is at Jobat that Rev. Dr. Howie and Mrs. Howie, who is a Charlottetown lady, are located.

Austria Still A Monarchy Says Hapsburgs

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Nov. 21—A crowd of 60 students hurling stench bombs and shouting "phooey" raided a legitimate banquet held here last night in honor of the 21st birthday of Prince Otto of Hapsburg, claimant to the throne of Austria-Hungary. Police immediately cleared the hall, but the anti-Hapsburg demonstrations continued outside.

Speaking at the meeting, Baron Friedrich Wiesner, attorney of ex-Empress Zita, mother of Otto, declared Austria was still a monarchy, in view of the fact that Emperor Charles withdrew from control of the country only on the condition of a plebiscite which was never held.

Therefore, the Baron said, Otto would presently be "Emperor of Austria."

Flies Seaward With Limited Gas Supply

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 21—(A.P.)—Determined not to come back, Mrs. Louise Turk Stanton, junior league leader who became despondent over the death of her husband, borrowed an aeroplane with a slight gasoline supply today and pointed it toward the open sea.

There was a four-hour gasoline supply in the plane's tanks, airport attendants said, and she was unreported tonight—hours after the last of the fuel should have been sucked into the motor.

"I'm just going out into space to find out what it's all about, and if there isn't anything—that's O. K. too," she wrote to Bert Maloney, manager of the airport and a friend.

"I'll be at sea, and you can count on me, the job will be thorough," she warned. "I don't want any wreckage found."

"Playing House" Gives Educational For Modern Child

CHICAGO, Nov. 21—The little red chair of childhood days will be out of the 1934 way of playing house according to a school of experts on the educational value of toys—unless, of course, that bit of vividly painted furniture fits into the color scheme and setting.


New ideas in this age-old game are illustrated in model dining rooms, bed-rooms and living rooms assembled in the toy section of a large departmental store which is getting ready for Christmas.

These exhibits of child-size furniture were arranged with the cooperation of the educational department of the University of Chicago.

The modern setting for playing house, as demonstrated by these models, is not a section of the playroom in which is assembled a six-inch-high kitchen range, flanked by a foot-high blue dresser and a white doll bed likewise out of proportion in the picture.


Instead it is a room or a section outfitted with appropriate and tasteful furniture scaled down from adult size to that suited to a young child—and the furniture corresponds in size, period and purpose. The pictures, as seen in these exhibits, have childhood themes, and the wallpaper and draperies have designs styled for children.
