To Examine Administration Of Pension Act  
Endorses Prem's Scheme For Trade Recovery

OTTAWA, June 24—(By The Canadian Press)—Appointment of the joint committee, comprising representatives of the government and of the returned soldiers organizations, with a view to examining the administration of the Pension Act will be made within the next few days, it was learned here tonight.

Some days before prorogation of Parliament, Hon. Murray MacLaren, Minister of Pensions and National Health, announced in the House of Commons that, to meet the wishes of the veterans, a joint committee would work during the recess and would investigate the whole matter of war pensions. Action on this will be taken shortly and the personnel announced.

It is understood that the matter of "frauds" in the pensions list will come within the scope of the enquiry. This was demanded by the veterans' officials yesterday, following publication of news items indicating that many persons had made applications for pension fraudulently, and that awards made by the various official bodies had been established to be based on evidence subsequently proven false. The implication that such frauds are wide-spread has aroused considerable resentment among officials of the returned soldiers organizations, who have received it as a reflection upon the integrity of the great body of returned men.

In order to clear the air they have demanded that the whole matter be probed, and such an investigation will likely come within the scope of the terms of reference to the committee.

LONDON, June 24—(Canadian Press Cable)—Cancellation of war debts and reparations in Europe, for which Premier Ramsay MacDonald is contending at Lausanne, was stressed as an essential preliminary to trade recovery by Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, replying on behalf of the Government to a non-confidence motion in the House of Commons tonight. The motion, sponsored by the Labor opposition, was decisively rejected by the House, by 446 votes to 47.

Russia was in a much happier position than Great Britain at the present time, declared George Lansbury, Labor leader, supporting the terms of the motion.

Mr. Baldwin claimed that the tariffs imposed by the Government were having the desired effect, although it would be two or three years before it was known whether official expectations would be fulfilled.

**Sudden Death Of Banker**

LONDON, June 24—Charles S. Blackwell, Toronto, Chairman of the board of the Dominion Bank, died suddenly at the hotel where he was staying here.

Mr. Blackwell, who was 69 years of age, collapsed while he was talking to friends. Doctors stated that death was due to heart failure.

**NEWSPRINT MERGER IS CANCELLED**

MONTREAL, June 24—The Star today says:

"The widely heralded merger of Canadian newspaper companies under the sponsorship of a committee representing the larger banking interests has now been definitely relegated to the indefinite future. The consolidation will move forward to its fruition through another route, and the ultimate result will be a more satisfactory ending to the unhappy flight of industry."

The so-called 'Beatty Committee', so named for its chairman E. W. Beatty, K. C., representing the Canadian chartered banks has now been faced with a situation which forbids of further progress at the present time. Negotiations which were planned on an extensive scale have been narrowed down to a point where further overtures are impossible. Time must now elapse to allow for a definite settling process.

"The entry of England's Lord Beaverbrook into the industry through Price Brothers, coupled with the financial collapse of the Abitibi has disturbed the inquiry in no small fashion. At the same time, considerable interest is evident in the chain of events with the international properties. While this company has been entrenched for some years, it is reported that signs of weakness have become apparent."

"There is considerable opposition to Lord Beaverbrook in his announced plans for Price Brothers and Company reorganization. Among the bondholders, there are small groups discussing the question of organization to secure further compensation for concessions which they are asked to make. The interest, it has been stated, will be paid if earned, and at the same time it is stated that the loss in Price Brothers operations for the current year will exceed one million dollars."

"The probable line of action in the newspaper industry as it moves nearer to the point where an equi-

able merger can be effected is through the way of receiverships for the top-heavy members. The Backus-Brooks group have been in the hands of a receiver for more than a year; Abitibi now appears scheduled for that position and there is general consensus of opinion that interest will not be forthcoming. Price Brothers and Company's position is akin to these two.

"Consolidated Paper Corporation is without fixed charges of consequence for a five-year period. It is thus in a position to face a period of severe operating conditions. St. Lawrence Corporation have small charges through one of its subsidiaries. Consolidated Paper's management dropped the Thunder Bay properties into the lap of the Abitibi Company in the earlier months of this year. Its liabilities were thus reduced and Abitibi's increased through a change in the bank loans by which the purchase was effected jointly by the old Canada Power and Paper Corporation and the Abitibi."

**AT WIMBLEDON**

WIMBLEDON, England June 24—Britain's leading contenders for the women's singles tennis title continued their march through the second round today at Wimbledon, while a reversal of form brought elimination for the country's third ranking star in the men's division. Invading forces from the United States swept along to new rounds that will provide stiffer competition.

Mrs. Eileen Bennett Whittingstall defeated Mrs. S. K. Edwards, also of England, 6-3, 4-6, 6-0. Betty Nuthall eliminated Miss S. Mavrogardato, Italy, 6-1, 6-1. Dorothy Round advanced with a victory over the Belgian girl, Josanne Sigart, 6-2, 6-0.

Something of an upset came today, however, when G. P. Hughes, Davis Cup player and Britain's third ranking star fell before Rodrich Menzel, of Czechoslovakia. It was a second round match that went to the towering Czech as Hughes failed to measure up to expected form, and the scores were 6-6, 1-6, 6-4, 6-2.

Mrs. Helen Wills Moody advanced today with the loss of only one game. She defeated Miss W. M. C.

**WORKING FOR THE FUTURE**

(Canadian Press Cable)  
LONDON, June 24—"At Lausanne, we are trying to clear up the messes of the past; at Ottawa we are working for the future," declared Sir Basil Blackett, former head of the Imperial and International Communications Limited, addressing a meeting of Conservatives at Westminster today.

That was the essential difference between the reparations conference and the Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa, Sir Basil added. "Above all," he remarked, "what is needed at Ottawa is the leadership of this country in the matter of currency."

**Mt'l. Firemen Laid To Rest**

MONTREAL, June 24—The rest automobile of Fire Chief Raoul Gauthier rolled slowly behind the fire truck bearing his body in the civic funeral cortege held here today for the director and three firemen who were killed in the Cymbeline disaster last Friday.

On the bonnet of the car lay the Chief's smoke-grimed white helmet with the red frontpiece which was picked up on the Vickers wharf after the explosion that ended his life. Underneath the helmet was a mackintosh. On the rear of the car was a floral fire alarm box of red carnations, bearing the words "Fire alarm. Last call box 8121," the final call the Chief answered.

**Gobbler Adopts Maternal Role**

COBOURG, June 24—Mrs. W. Rogers of Fenella, has a gobbler that has assumed the duties of motherhood. Mrs. Rogers, as an experiment, set the gobbler on 11 turkey eggs.
