CHARLOTTETOWN GIVES WARM WELCOME TO APOSTOLIC DELEGATE TO CANADA AND NFLD.

Most Reverend Andrea Cassulo, Papal Emisary Received By Thousands In City Yesterday. -- Impressive And Colorful Procession Marks Event. -- Addresses From Clergy And Laity Presented To His Excellency.

Catholics of Charlottetown united yesterday to extend a colorful and impressive greeting to His Excellency the Papal delegate to Canada, and Newfoundland, Archbishop Andrea Cassulo, representing His Holiness Pope Pius XI, on his first visit to Prince Edward Island. Thousands of people crowded the streets until the congestion was so great that the parade of cars from the S. S. Hochelaga was diverted to less frequented streets and many who waited hours for a glimpse of the church dignitary were disappointed. The Apostolic Delegate was accompanied by Private Secretary Monsignor Bearzoth. His Excellency arrived at 1.30 by S. S. Hochelaga, gaily decked with flags and bunting in honor of the distinguished visitor who was accompanied from the pier by Right Reverend Monsignor McLean, V. G., Rev. J. J. McDonald, Rev. A. J. McIntyre, Justice Arseneault and P. J. Casey. His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown boarded the steamer extending hearty greetings and welcome to the Papal Emisary, after which he was driven to the Bishop's Palace where, on the steps, after being presented with a large basket of flowers he bestowed the apostolic blessing while hundreds knelt and bared their heads in respect and reverence. Eight Fourth Degree members of the Knights of Columbus and the Boy Scouts acted as a guard of honor. The following Knights in full uniform with sash and sword took up their position on both sides of the car: Hon. John A. MacDonald, Dr. W. J. MacMillan, M.

P. P. Adrian F. Arseneault, M. P. P. William Moran, Andrew Hennessy, D. B. Macdonald, Thomas Campbell and W. M. Flynn. The League of the Cross Boy Scouts who marched ahead of the car, were under command of Assistant Provincial Commissioner, P. J. Hapenny. They were: Arthur Moran, Troop Leader; Jack Schofield, Johnny McAleer, David Gheppard, James Lightizer, Prosper Peters, Stanley McClintock. His Excellency's car with the Guard of Honour, was in the rear of the procession which was headed by the cross bearers, followed by the League of Queen Square School, Pupils of Notre Dame Convent, Pupils of St. Joseph's Convent, Catholic Women's League, Third Order of St. Francis, St. Charles Auxiliary, League of the Sacred Heart, St. Joseph's Sodality, St. Assumption Society, Benevolent Irish Society, Children of Mary, Knights of Columbus, Catholic Clergy, Choir Boys. The League of the Cross Band furnished music for the occasion. The weather was fine and warm and the parade, which in certain respects resembled a Corpus Christi procession made an impressive and colorful spectacle. The little flower girls and boys of the boys' choir and Children of Mary arrived about the steps of the Palace made a very pleasing appearance. Appropriate hymns, including patriotic songs and O Canada by the children were sung with great zest and fervor. The Palace was decorated to suit the auspicious occasion. In the evening a procession was held from the Palace to the Cathedral, where at 8 o'clock His Excellency was tendered addresses from the Clergy and Laity; His Lordship O'Leary and Mr. J. J. Johnson, C. reading the respective addresses which appear below. His Excellency briefly replied thanking His Lordship the Bishop; the Clergy, the Catholic congregation in general and the most cordial welcome tendered to him. Solemn Benediction was then celebrated by the Archbishop assisted by Rev. James Murphy, Rector of St. Dunstan's; Deacon; Rev. Fr. R. McKenzie, Sub Deacon; Rev. P. Walsh, Deacon; Deacon and Mr. Louis Dougan, Second Master of Ceremonies. His Lordship was assisted at the Throne by Monsignor McLean, V. G., P. A., and Right Reverend Monsignor Maurice McDonald, P. A. At the solemn entry His Excellency was received at the door of the Cathedral by Monsignor McDonald. The canopy bearers were: Messrs John Sullivan, Desmond O'Leary, Benjamin McDonald, Joseph Campbell, Joseph McMillan, Anthony Francis. Sir Charles Dalton was present in the Sanctuary during services. Yesterday evening the Delegate was tendered a clergy dinner at Saint Dunstan's University where upwards of sixty priests represented all the parishes on the Island were present. Other guests were: Chief Justice Mathieson, Justice Arseneault, Justice Hazzard, His Worship Mayor Yeo, Mr. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Public Works; Dr. S. R. Jenkins, Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, Dr. J. D. McGuigan, J. D. Stewart, K. C. His Excellency was received at the University by the Rector, Rev. James Murphy. The dinner was presided over by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary. His Excellency called on His Honorable Lieutenant Governor Hertz at 5.30 yesterday evening, who returned the call last night previous to the

general reception in the Bishop's Palace. This morning His Excellency will celebrate Mass in the Cathedral at 7.30 and on Friday morning at the same hour he will celebrate Mass for all the Societies, both men and women, of the parish. At 10 o'clock a visit will be made to the Hospital, Sacred Heart Home Orphanage and Mount Saint Mary. At 2.30 His Excellency will visit the Academy and thence to Saint Joseph's Convent. All the ladies' societies of the parish will meet His Excellency at Notre Dame Academy at 8 o'clock on Thursday evening. At 10 o'clock on Friday morning His Excellency will leave for Allanor (Dalry) where a dinner will be tendered him by the Knights of Columbus, after which he proceeded to Souris, visiting the different parishes en route. The dinner promises to be one of the outstanding events of the year. The Knights have made extensive preparations and to date nearly all reservations have been taken up. Members of the different Councils throughout the Island will attend and the officers of the local Councils will be present to make arrangements before noon tomorrow. Cars are being provided to take the members to Allanor leaving the K. of C. home at 10.30. To add to the enjoyment music will be provided during the day. He leaves Charlottetown on Saturday morning.

GIFT TO STATE IN HONOR OF DAUGHTER

Viscount and Lady Inchcape Pay Tribute to Daughter's Memory. LONDON, July 4.—In memory of their daughter, the Hon. Elsie Mackay, who perished in a trans-Atlantic flight, Viscount and Lady Inchcape have given £500,000 (\$2,500,000) to reduce the National Debt. This announcement was made by Winston Churchill, chancellor of the Exchequer in the House of Commons today. The money will be placed in trust and will be known as the Elsie Mackay fund. The sum given to the National Debt is the residue of the Hon. Miss Mackay's estate. The donation will be left to accumulate for fifty years. The Hon. Elsie Mackay, third daughter of Lord Inchcape, British shipping magnate, made the attempt to cross the Atlantic by air with Captain Walter Hinchliffe. The takeoff was from Cranwell, Aerodrome, England, on the morning of March 13. No trace of the two has been found since. Lord Inchcape was opposed to any such adventure but at the time was in Egypt.

Detroit Heat Wave Causes Three Deaths

(Special to the Guardian) DETROIT, July 4.—Three persons are dead here from the sultry heat wave which has gripped Detroit for the last three days, and a score of others were being treated for heat prostrations, dog bites and temporary insanity attributed to the weather. Local thunderstorms promised some relief today, but hundreds of thousands left the city on boat and automobile trips. Police restrictions against fire works resulted in only a few minor accidents being reported.

LONDON PRESS DISCUSSES BYNG APPOINTMENT

Ex-Governor General Puts Himself in a Position Where He May Be Discharged on Twenty Four Hours Notice. LONDON, July 4.—The appointment of Viscount Byng as Commissioner of Metropolitan Police produces an extraordinary position. The police commissioner, nominally a servant of the public and constantly the servant of the Home Secretary, will have a seat in the House of Lords and will therefore be in a position to answer questions himself in Parliament concerning the force. The appointment of Viscount Byng of Vimy, former Governor-General of Canada, as head of Scotland Yard in succession to Sir William Horwood, retiring commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, was discussed with the liveliest interest today. All commentators agreed that the public and constantly assumed one of the most arduous tasks in the whole field of public administration and one of especial difficulty at the present time. Viscount Byng stipulated that the Home Secretary might dismiss him on twenty-four hours notice. It is understood, however, that before the comparatively short period of three years, Sir William was Commissioner for over seven years. It is suggested that the new commissioner during his term of office will investigate the machinery of the force root and branch. "There is nothing wrong with the personnel of the great body of the metropolitan police," the Times says editorially today. "What is becoming more clear is that something must be called the system, the atmosphere of the force, the war years—is ripe for revision. Every one is beginning to realize that we are placing upon the force an impossible task, and almost inviting irregular methods to achieve it."

Supreme Court Yesterday

Manslaughter Trial Continued — Jurors View Scene of the Accident. MORNING SESSION The hearing of the case of Archibald MacKinnon on trial for manslaughter was continued yesterday, before His Lordship Chief Justice Mathieson. The first witness to testify was H. A. Reardon, who, a civil engineer, and then proceeded to explain a plan of the scene of the crime which he had prepared. The witness was cross examined by Dr. I. J. Yeo (Sworn). Examined by Mr. Saunders, deposed that, together with Dr. S. R. Jenkins he had made a post-mortem examination of the body of the deceased, George Simmons on May 15th last, and went on to describe the findings. The evidence was similar to that given at the coroner's inquest and the preliminary inquiry. The injuries to the skull, brain and leg were dealt with by the witness in some detail. In his opinion death had been caused by the injuries received to the skull, and brain and the fracture of the bones in the lower leg. Cross examined by J. D. Stewart, Dr. Yeo said that he did not believe the injury to the lower limb by itself would have caused death, though it was a contributing factor. Edward Hartinger (Sworn). Examined by Mr. Saunders deposed that he was a chauffeur. On the day of the accident he was at the Queen Hotel, at 1 p. m. He left the Queen Hotel, and drove up Spring Park Road past the scene of the accident. He described the posture of the body. DESPATCH ARRIVES AT SCENE OF WRECK

Vice-Admiral Cowan Expected to Take Charge of Salvage Operations and Institute the Customary Court-Martial. (Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., July 4.—The flagship Despatch bearing Vice-Admiral Sir Walter Cowan, commander-in-chief of the British West Indies and North Atlantic squadron, arrived at the entrance to the harbor tonight and anchored a mile off the scene of the stranding of the British light cruiser Dauntless Monday afternoon. Vice-Admiral Cowan was expected to board the wrecked cruiser at once and take charge of salvage operations. The Despatch was at Bermuda when news of the Dauntless' predicament was received by wireless and leaving immediately after the stranding of the cruiser. It is expected Admiral Cowan will institute the customary court martial shortly, although it is possible he will await the arrival of Vice-Admiral Fuller who is to relieve Sir Walter and who is expected here within a fortnight.

Three Men Killed By Lightning

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, July 4.—Lightning dealt death to two men in a group of 33 workmen huddled in a small shack at the Canadian Pacific Railway bridge just East of Donlands Station yesterday afternoon. Most of the others were thrown to the ground or tossed against the walls of the shack, but only one received injuries which necessitated his removal to a hospital. Almost at the same time another savage lightning bolt struck a stable at 422 Greenwood Ave. killing one and injuring another. Both had taken shelter from the storm.

Post Office Raided

(Special to the Guardian) LOUISVILLE, Que., July 4.—The Post Office here was raided last night, thieves entered the building and made away with a safe six feet high, which contained \$3,000 in stamps and \$500 in currency. The robbers also made a clean sweep of all money orders, letters, parcels and everything movable. District Inspector of Post Offices Gaudet was investigating the robbery today.

Aviator Returns

(Canadian Press) MOSCOW, July 4.—Tass news agency says that the Russian aviator Babushkin who has been missing for five days and was supposed to have perished in the Arctic ice returned safely to the ice breaker Malgin today after a vain struggle with winds and icebergs in an attempt to locate the missing Noble party.

ANOTHER K. O. FOR MCKENNA

(Special to the Guardian) CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 3.—Jack McKenna continued his winning streak by knocking out Tony Ross of St. Louis in the eighth round of the scheduled ten round contest at Indianapolis last night. Ross substituted for Joe Zink, who failed to put an appearance. McKenna outclassed his opponent from the beginning of hostilities and subjected his foe to a terrific battering. McKenna's heavy hitting powers was in evidence at all times. He floored Ross three times in the fifth round and dropped him again twice in the sixth session before he was counted out.

Demonstration In Wall Street

(Special to the Guardian) NEW YORK, July 4.—An attempted demonstration in front of the Wall Street office of J. P. Morgan today landed sixteen women and men in jail, several hundred members of the "all American and anti-imperialistic League" gathered with unfurled banners, in the financial district. Just about noon hour when thousands of stenographers and clerks filled the streets. A special detail of 44 detectives and patrolmen were waiting for them.

Chancellor Mueller Pledges Allegiance to the League of Nations and Renunciation of All Ideas of Revenge.

BERLIN, July 4.—Dr. Herman Mueller, the Chancellor, submitted the program of the new cabinet to the Reichstag today, and the nature of the program would indicate that the government does not consider itself a make-shift body, but is determined to co-operate with the new Reichstag for a full term of years. After asserting that "the foundation of the new German Republic stands firm and unshakable," the Chancellor announced that Germany's foreign policy will be continued along the lines set down by Gustave Stresemann, of "Peaceful conciliation with renunciation of all ideas of revenge." Declaring that "with the whole German people the government is convinced of the justice for our demand for immediate liberation of the occupied areas," Dr. Mueller went on to say that the occupying powers, falling to take advantage of the political developments in recent years, are keeping up a barrier which "stands in the way of establishing a real relationship of mutual trust between peoples." The Chancellor then pledged allegiance to the League of Nations, saying: "We see in it one of the most important factors of international life and thereby also of promotion of national interests." His programme on this subject is in the nature of an appeal to the nations for universal disarmament. "The world must be made to realize the untenable state of affairs that the Russian Revolution is completely disarmed amidst other countries armed to the teeth." On the question of reparations, the Chancellor lay stress on how after the Dawes plan had worked without friction for four years, the conviction has gained ground in all circles concerned that a final settlement is not only desirable, but also possible.

On Inspection Trip

MINAKI, Ont., July 4.—As far as the Canadian National Railway are concerned the roadbed, rolling stock and facilities in general are in a satisfactory state declared Sir Henry Thornton, Chairman and President of the Canadian National Railway who arrived at Minaki last night on his annual inspection trip of the lines of the National system. About 45,000 cars are immediately available for moving the western grain crop, Sir Henry stated. Earnings have been showing an encouraging increase and it is his hope that the present ratio of increase will be maintained for the balance of the year. On concluding his visit to Minaki Lodge, Sir Henry will leave Monday for Winnipeg and from there continue west. His itinerary will keep him in the west most of July.
