Civil Service Commissioner Appointed — Budget Modifications Anticipated When Bill Goes Before Committee.

AMBASSADOR UNABLE TO DISCUSS PLANS

Sir Esmond Ovey Returns To London To Confer With The Cabinet. Reports British Subjects As All Well.

LONDON, April 2. — (A.P.) — Sir Esmond Ovey, British Ambassador to London, returned to London today to confer with the Cabinet concerning the arrest in Soviet Russia three weeks ago of six British subjects employed by the English electrical firm, Metropolitan-Vickers.

MOSCOW, April 2. — (A.P.) — Allan Monkhouse, Moscow Director for the Metropolitan-Vickers electrical firm, and a subordinate, Charles Nordwell, have been formally charged with military as well as economic espionage, fostering "wrecking activities," and bribery.

This means that despite liberty on their own recognizance shortly after their arrest with four other British employees three weeks ago, they will be tried along with their four associates who are still imprisoned by the OGPU (secret police).

NEW NAZI OFFICE CREATED BY HITLER

The Foreign Political Division Of The Nazi Party Is First Step Towards Seizure Of The Foreign Office.

BERLIN, April 2.—While the nation's attention was engrossed in the anti-Jewish boycott Saturday an event occurred which is likely to have the widest foreign ramifications—the creation by Chancellor Adolf Hitler of the "foreign political division of the Nazi party" with Alfred Rosenberg in charge.

Baron Konstantin Von Neurath offered his resignation Friday as Foreign Minister and was with difficulty persuaded by Vice-Chancellor Franz Von Papen to remain. Baron Von Neurath, it was understood, feared the adverse effect of the anti-Jewish boycott on Germany's international relations and saw in the Rosenberg appointment the first drastic Nazi step toward later seizure of the Foreign Office.

Herr Rosenberg, Nazi member of the Reichstag, and chief editor of the Hitler organ Voelkischer Beobachter, which is published both in Berlin and Munich, long has been the Chancellor's chief foreign political adviser and was repeatedly sent on confidential missions to London and elsewhere.

Forty years old, he belongs to the younger Nazi generation which has a bitter hatred of Soviet Russia, and informed circles believe that he would not hesitate to break relations with the U. S. S. R. if given full sway. He is known for his anti-Semitism and his opposition to the Catholic Church.

Former Viceroy Of India Is Dead

LONDON, April 2. — (C. P. Cable) — Lord Chelmsford, former Viceroy of India, who was renowned for the part he played in Indian Constitutional reforms, was dead here today. A sudden heart seizure ended his career Saturday.

Lord Chelmsford was born in 1868 and was educated at Oxford University, where he attained a law degree. His many positions included the Governorship of Queensland and of New South Wales and the agent-generalship for New South Wales. He was Viceroy of India from 1906 to 1921 and in 1924 became first Lord of the Admiralty.

Four Are Dead As Result Of Fires In Ontario

TORONTO, April 2.—Four persons are dead as a result of two fires Saturday in widely separated parts of Ontario. Joseph Leroux, 78, and his son, William, 35, were burned to death at Chelmsford in an early morning blaze; and the charred remains of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph P. Hunt were found in the ruins of their home at Carleton Place. Firemen at Carleton Place after flames had destroyed the two-story brick building.

Even George's serious illness in 1928 did not quell rumors of the beautiful debutante's engagement to the prince. While Lady Anne was ill with pneumonia, it was said that his royal highness was kept informed by cable of her condition during his African trip. Lady Anne and her attendants at the wedding wore the empire styles fashionable in the first Duchesse of Wellington's time. The "Iron Duke" was her great-great-grandfather.

Verigin May Yet Be Deported

OTTAWA, April 2.—Peter Verigin, spiritual and temporal leader of the Doukhobor community may yet be deported, Hon. Wesley A. Gordon, acting Minister of Immigration indicated tonight. The department, Mr. Gordon said, has Verigin's case in hand and unless something unforeseen develops action looking to deportation will likely be taken.

After serving nine months of an 18-months sentence for perjury in Saskatchewan Verigin was pardoned and taken to Halifax for deportation. Court proceedings launched there resulted in his release and Mr. Justice H. Mellish of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia ruled the cull leader's pardon after serving half his sentence freed him from liability to deportation.

In order to get a final ruling on the question the department submitted a series of questions to the Supreme Court of Canada and the court's answers were at variance with the reasons for judgment given by Mr. Justice Mellish.

Pan American Airways Gains Foothold In East

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The Pan American Airways, which operates commercial planes in the New World from the Arctic Circle to Argentina, yesterday became a partner of the Chinese National Government and gained a far East foothold through acquisition of minority stock interest in the Chinese National air transport system.

CLARKE CITY CHURCH IS BURNED

The Roman Catholic Church of Saguenay County On The North Shore Of The St. Lawrence Is In Ruins. \$75,000 Damage.

CLARKE CITY, Que., April 2.—The Roman Catholic Cathedral of this Saguenay County town on the north shore of the St. Lawrence about 450 miles east of Quebec City was a mass of blackened ruins to night. Fire which broke out about 7 a.m. Saturday while Rev. Father Joseph Gallix, a member of the Eudiste Order and Cure of the parish, was saying Mass burned the church to the ground and considerably damaged the nearby presbytery. Damages are estimated at about \$75,000.

Father Gallix noticed a wreath of smoke curl from a door leading into the cellar while he was saying Mass and before anyone could investigate flames burst into the transept. Several persons attending Mass hurriedly left the building while Father Gallix carried the Host to safety.

Firemen and apparatus were summoned. By that time the blaze had made such progress in the

Regard Injuries Of Crash Victims As Serious

NEODESHA, Kas., April 2.—Physicians expressed belief tonight that eight survivors of an aeroplane crash which brought disaster to the Winnipeg Trollers basketball team near here Friday will recover, but regarded injuries of several of the young athletes as extremely serious.

Slight hope had been held for the lives of Ian Wooley and Andy Brown, two members of the team. Eight members of the basketball squad, managers, pilots and the plane owner, a total of 14 persons, were flying from Tulsa, Okla., to MN espolis at the time of the crash.

Wooley and Brown regained consciousness today and were able to recognize visitors of the Tulsa Diamond Oilers, an Oklahoma team by which they had been defeated twice in an International series at Tulsa.

To Investigate Morgan Bank

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The United States Senate will be asked tomorrow to grant the broadest power in its possession for an investigation of the inside operating facts of J. P. Morgan and Company, and America's other big private banks.

Police Attempt To Probe Mt'l. Church Fires

An Attempt To Burn Down St. Edouard Church Is Frustrated — St. James Basilica, Cathedral Of The Roman Catholic Diocese Is Threatened. Guards And Police Are Keeping Greatest Vigilance.

MONTREAL, April 2.—Criminals threatened St. James Basilica, cathedral of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Montreal, just one week after an incendiary fire destroyed St. Jacques Le Mineur Church. In the intervening time another of Montreal's churches, St. Edouard, was also menaced, it was feared over the week-end.

Fortunately the bundle of rags and papers used to set the Basilica fire burned itself out. Early in the morning a milkman saw a man jumping off the roof of a low wing of the Cathedral joining another man on the ground. The milkman, whose name was not obtained, saw smoke billowing from a cellar window and hurried to the nearest police station.

Police and church officials, hastily called by telephone, rushed to the cellar of the building, where they found the bundle of rags which had burned a hole a quarter of an inch deep in the floor planking. The criminals had chosen their ground carefully. The small room into which the flaming mass had been thrown, was filled with five tons of books which would have blazed madly had the fire once spread to them.

Two broken windows told a mute story of how the men entered. All day members of the arson squad

EARTH SHOCKS ARE PREDICTED

ANN ARBOR, Mich., April 2.—(A.P.)—Several earthquakes in the Great Lakes region and the St. Lawrence valley are almost certain to come, in the opinion of Prof. William Herbert Jobs, University of Michigan Geologist. Prof. Jobs also forecasts shocks for the lower Mississippi Valley and southeastern States.

In an interview Saturday Prof. Jobs said scientists can name the places but not the times of future earthquakes. The shocks, Prof. Jobs said, result from jolting mass movements of portions of the earth's outer shell in response to forces constantly acting within.

"Within the Great Lake-St. Lawrence region," Prof. Jobs explained, "earthquakes indicate a slow rise or recovery of position coming about as a result of the melting of the former continental glaciers which once covered the region. Freed from its pre-historic load of glacial ice, the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence region is rising, while the lower Mississippi Valley is being depressed by millions of tons of silt."

"So long as light shocks are fairly frequent," Prof. Jobs said, "one may feel that adjustment is being found without reaching a dangerous condition. It is when within an earthquake district tremblers cease, that one has just cause to be concerned."

NEW DRAFT IN PEACE PLAN

French Premier Is Now Considering Text Which Follows Along British Plan.

PARIS, April 2.—(A.P.)—The Journal said today that a new draft of Premier Mussolini's four-power peace proposal had been delivered by Lord William Tyrrell, British Ambassador to France, to Foreign Minister Joseph Paul-Boncour.

The latter, the newspaper added had passed the document on to Premier Daladier.

The text based on British views is said to resemble slightly the disarmament plan Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain recently presented at Geneva with certain reservations and modification of the Mussolini proposals.

These changes are said to concern particularly that section of the Mussolini Plan which provides that Britain, France, and Italy—in the event of the failure of full disarmament (by which Germany would realize equality)—should pledge gradual realization of equality for Germany, Austria, Hungary, and Bulgaria.

An early French decision in the matter is envisaged as a result of the views of Nicholas Tulescu, Rumanian Foreign Minister, Lord Tyrrell, and Ambassador De Jouvenel, who brought a fresh report of Signor Mussolini's ideas. The Cabinet will consider the question on Monday.
