Final Sermon Of Evolution Series

REV. J.S. BONNELL PREACHES N ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH. (Saint John Globe.) Rev. J. S. Bonnell preached on Sunday evening, in St. Andrew's Kirk, the final sermon of the series on "Evolution." His subject was "Evolution and man's interest in these series steadily has been increasing until last night the church was completely filled with an audience of over eleven hundred people. The text was from Genesis 2, 7: "The Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living soul." This text, said Mr. Bonnell is a religious interpretation of the fact of man's creation. But for an account of the process or method of this creation we must go to the most reverent and best accredited scientists. There are but two answers to the problem. Either man was a separate creation or he was created by evolution from other forms of life. For the most part scientists favor the second viewpoint. They offer three-fold evidence. First, the fact that civilization is in its infancy. Go back five hundred years and North America is a wilderness of forest inhabited by Indians. Two thousand years ago Great Britain was inhabited by painted savages. So in a few thousand years we come to a man, with flint weapons, and his paintings on walls of caves representing figures now extinct. Second the evidence of anatomy and physiology. There is the fact that physically man resembles the higher animals in a vast number of details. So, too, the scientist claims that man's body is a machine, or rather, is inherited from his animal ancestry, such as the third eyelid, the gill slits, the six atrophied muscles going to the human ear, etc. These, he claims are indelible marks of man's physical origin. The third evidence is that of pre-historic skulls. The speaker gave an interesting account of how these were discovered, and showed that many of the so-called reconstructions were largely imaginative. Even though science should account for the origin of man's body by evolution, many questions are left unanswered. Why does man come man's soul? Science is not competent to answer this question—the answer must come from the Bible. It tells us that man's soul has come from God and has been made in His image. Mr. Bonnell then told of Charles Darwin's descent of man, and cannibals of Patagonia as animals in human bodies beyond all hope. Twenty five years later Darwin found these people Christianized and civilized. A thousand years labor on any creature lower than man could produce a result like this, for there was no soul to respond to the Divine. Even suppose science may succeed in proving every link in the chain of man's evolution, God would not be dishonored nor would man be degraded. The speaker then told of the evolution of modern surgery from that of the thirteenth century. In an operating room of that century there were huge knives, saws, shears, no anaesthetics, no antiseptics; the patient was forcibly held by attendants during the operation. He contrasted this with the magnificently equipped modern operating theatres. The surgeon of today gloried in the fact that from such a crude beginning his science had evolved until it has become such a blessing to the race. Are the achievements of the British race any less glorious because our ancestors were painted savages? Are the colors of the butterfly less beautiful because it has evolved from the lowly caterpillar? Is the saint less a saint if it be proven that he is the final product of the vast ancestral line of life that has peopled the world in all ages; if it be proven that man was made not in a moment of time, but by majestic laws working throughout millions of years until he was met for the rebreathing of a higher and more God-like nature? If the final proof were offered to-morrow we should remain unchanged. We should be conscious of no uplifting and of no fall. Immediate or age-long creation, if God be the author, must all be Divine. Lay hold of the truth of the reality of God and the grandeur and high destiny of the human soul, and our birthright is secure.

MR. ALLAN SMITH

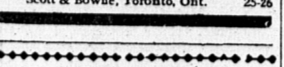
