MR. AND MRS. WM. TAYLOR

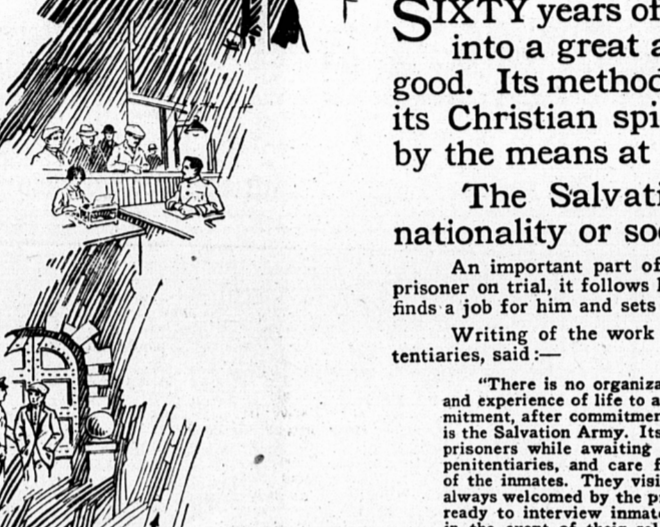

Their efforts in our institutions can be truthfully characterized as 'noble,' owing largely to their sympathetic and practical insight into the condition of the unfortunates committed to our care."

BIG MADEIRA CONTRACT GIVEN TO BRITISH FIRM

LONDON, April 28.—A £1,500,000 contract has been given to Messrs. William Mulhead, MacDonald, Wilson, and Co., Limited, the contractors of Parliament Street, S.W., to make a harbor at Puncchal, Madeira.

Designed by Sir Murdoch Macdonald, the harbor breakwater will be of rubble-stone, 3,200 feet long in 54 feet of water, and it is estimated that four of the world's largest liners will be able to manoeuvre easily inside the harbor. At present ships have to stand off two miles from shore to land goods or passengers.

All the harbor equipment, including cranes, storage sheds, and rails, will be British made, and 100 British engineers and experts and two dredgers will be sent out for the work, which is to start in May and will last about six years.

ALBERTA'S SUGAR BEETS

Sugar beets produced in Alberta experimentally have passed a very successful test at the hands of the chemists of the Utah-Idaho Sugar Company, which is erecting a big sugar refinery at Raymond, in the southern part of the province. The analysis showed that the Alberta beet produced 18.43 per cent of sugar—an average well above factory practice. The plant will be in operation in time to handle this year's beet crop. The company plans to use 75,000 tons or more of the 1925 yield.
