N. Y. Concludes Recovery Week

NEW YORK, March 23—(AP)—The stock market Saturday concluded its first recovery week since early February, although the slowest in about two years, with irregularly higher tendencies persisting. Professional buying and short covering throughout the six sessions was based mainly on the idea that five successive losing weeks called for a technical revival. A batch of good earnings statements also provided a prop. Most brokerage customers, however, held aloof because of bearishness over wage-price situations, foreign complications, gyrating commodities and business trends.

Dealings were sluggish from the start of the final session but advances predominated at the close. The week's turnover of 3,738,860 shares was the smallest since the period ended April 7, 1945.

Airlines enjoyed a mild flurry Saturday following the granting of a passenger fare boost.

Pennsylvania-Central was up 3-8 at 12, T.W.A. 3-8 at 20 3-8 and Eastern 1-4 at 21 1-4.

Eastman Kodak added 2 1-2 at 240, U. S. Gypsum 1 1-4 at 104 and Norfolk and Western 1 at 241 1-2. Modest plus marks were retained by U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester, Douglas Aircraft, Boeing, Consolidated Edison, American Smelting, Air Reduction, Anaconda, Johns-Manville, Santa Fe, Great Northern Railway, Phillips, Paramount Pictures, Loew's and Texas Co.

Repairs of the losers included General Motors, Chrysler, Goodyear, Bendix Aviation, American Telephone, North American, American Water Works, General Electric, American Can, Standard Oil (N.J.), American Woolen, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Northern Pacific and Baltimore and Ohio.

McIntyre, with a loss of 1-2, was the heaviest loser among Canadian issues which generally gave up fractions. Canadian Pacific and Distillers Seagram each lost 1-8 and Dome Mines was unchanged.

Canadian issues were quiet on the curb market.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up 1 of a point at 65.2, a high since March 7, and on the week showed an advance of 1.6 points, best upturn since the period ended Feb. 1.

Seats run about the equivalent of 75 cents to \$1.25, which in rubles is high for the ordinary Russian, but Muscovites love the show and the hall is always packed.

Officially, the circus is taken seriously in the Soviet Union, judging from the newspapers. Here are excerpts from a review of the show in the newspaper "Trud".

"The circus completed a return to the classics of circus art. The new Soviet style is in culture, nobility and moral purity a truthful fulfillment. This whole performance is the circus classics' art of the arena in the purest form. The Soviet circus is cultured and therein lies its main distinction from the bourgeois circus."

The review went on to criticize the clowns with a comment that this was "the only field in which our circus has not yet found itself. Despite constant effort, it is buffoonery."

P.S.—I thought the clowns were pretty good.

MOSCOW, Mar. 20—(CP)—The state circus is the big attraction in Moscow these wintry days and Russian children and adults crowding into a big hall get the same kick from the trapeze artists, clowns and animal and Cossack acts as any circus goes anywhere.

There aren't any peanuts and popcorn to throw into the sawdust ring and the applause isn't as unruly and boisterous as when the Big Top comes to town at home but Russians—young and old—really enjoy their circus.

It is only a one-ringer but in that small space, Cossack horsemen in red and blue uniforms put on as thrilling a display of stunt riding as you will see any-
