The latest news, first of all. -The funeral of the late J. F. C. Hall, Red Cross, will take place tomorrow at two p. m.

-There was quite a difference in the reading of the mercury at the meteorological station, Summerside, between Wednesday noon and Thursday morning. The highest reading was 52 degrees above zero, an exceptionally high reading for January, and the lowest was 14 degrees above.

-The marriage took place on Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 30th, at the residence of Douglas Reid Campbell of his daughter Laura Annie to Andrew N. Carver of Vernon River. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Geo. Miller of Alberton in the presence of a large number of invited friends.

-R. S. Bowness, meteorological agent at Summerside, gives the following facts for 1928. Total rainfall during year, two feet eight inches. On the night of August 2nd 3.26 inches fell. The total snow precipitation was five feet eleven inches. On eighteen days the mercury dropped below zero, the coldest being on the 10th, July 8th was the hottest day, registering 89.
