BELFAST UNITED CHURCH.—Rev. J. A. McLellan, Valleyfield, writes:—When the vote was taken on the Church Union question in Belfast, 157 votes were cast against Union and 45 votes in favor. It was hoped by most that the congregation could be kept undivided, but the anti-Union leaders in their presentations of their cause alienated rather than attracted those not of their views. With this was irregularity and uncertainty of services. After waiting for the Fall and Winter and no improvement of the situation seemed to be in sight, those who favored the Church going into union decided to organize for themselves. A petition was signed by 97 members and adherents representing 45 families desiring organization, and reception into the United Church. A meeting was held March 30 at Eldon, where all sections of the congregation were well represented, and organization was effected, by-laws were adopted and committees and officers appointed. Messrs. M. W. Murchison and F. S. Reeves were appointed with Rev. J. A. McLellan, who was present, to present the case and needs of the congregation before Presbytery and seek reception into the United Church. When it became likely that organization would be proceeded with, those interested wished to share immediately in the church's work, and proceeded to help the Maintenance and Extension Fund with the result that \$108.50 was contributed. This is evidence of the interest and enthusiasm now existing and an earnest of what will be done in days to come. With sincere regret old co-workers are parted with, but duty urges forward.

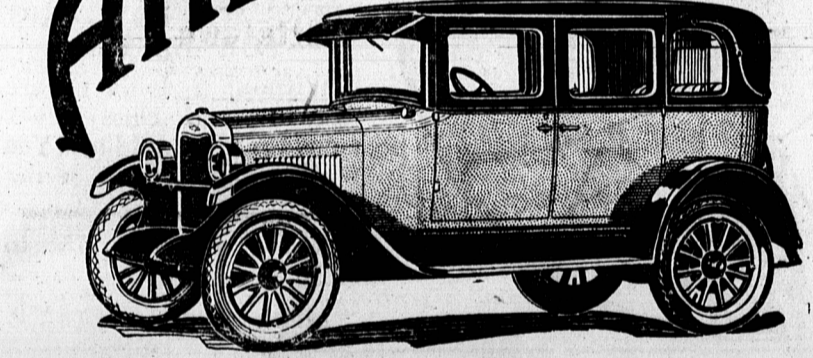
