HON. W. S. FIELDING has wired W. W. Clarke, Sec'y of the Charlottetown Board of Trade as follows:—

"Tariff Commission will arrive at Charlottetown Tuesday, ninth January, from Pictou, and will hold a meeting on Wednesday, tenth. Leave next morning for Pictou. Please cause public notice to be given."

F. B. S. HAMILTON, who holds a diploma from the American School of Magnetic Healing of Nevada, Missouri, signed by its President, S. A. Weltmer, has taken rooms on Fitzroy St. between Great George and Queen, where he can be consulted by any persons desiring his services. The above school was incorporated in 1898, and Prof. Hamilton as one of its graduates is not a stranger to this province, having formerly practiced in another part of this city as well as in Summerside. On Wednesday, Dec. 27th, the Mission Band of Pleasant Valley gave a Christmas Entertainment in the church of that place. A large and attentive audience greeted the boys and girls, as they in a pleasing and interesting manner performed their various parts. The program consisted of readings, recitations, dialogues, exercises, solos and choruses. The principal theme of the entertainment, expressed in song and recitation, was, "The Babe of Bethlehem," whose coming brought "great joy." The collection, which was in aid of foreign missions, amounted to \$5.50.

PURSUANT to notice the meeting called by the Robertson Farmers' Institute was held in the Eldon Hall on Friday the 22nd ult. The Hall was filled to its utmost capacity. The President took the chair at 7 o'clock and after some institutes work being done declared the meeting open for the discussion of the question for which it was called, viz. The promotion of a branch line of railway from a point at or near Eldon to Montague Bridge. The Secretary read letters from Hon. F. L. Hazard, A. B. Warburton and L. E. Prowse regretting their inability to attend. The meeting was addressed by a number of the residents of Point Prim, Portage, Pinette, Newtown and Eldon, each pointing out that from the first inception of the agitation for the construction of the Southern Branch being built, the community was always assured it would pass through this section, whereas at present a large number of the inhabitants are some sixteen miles distant from the nearest Booking Station and consequently are unable to derive the benefit this large section demands. Addresses were also given by Alex. Martin, Senator Robertson, A. A. McLean, D. P. Irving, and F. B. McRae, after which the meeting which was characterized by the greatest harmony closed with three cheers for the proposed branches.

There died at his home in Marshfield on Dec. 3rd, 1905 James Heron after a short illness. Mr. Heron was a native of Fort Augustus but in early life removed to Charlottetown and was in the employ of the late John Ings, Esq, when he published the "Islander" newspaper. The writer has often heard Mr. Heron tell of the hand press that he helped to turn to print the paper. He was afterwards for a number of years in the employ of the late Hon. J. C. Pope and after that for years with the Hon. D. Ferguson as farmer, and latterly for some years with William Bishop of French Fort in whose employ he was at the time of his death. A faithful servant and obliging and upright he was in all his different places. He was in the 65th year of his age.
