Railway Presidents Review Their Work

(Canadian Press)

WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 21.—The general betterment of conditions, industrial, commercial and agricultural, which occurred during the latter half of 1925, was reflected in a striking fashion in the earnings of the Canadian National Railways.

"During the first half of 1925 there was a distinct falling off in the gross receipts of the Canadian National railways, though by careful operating and a strict adherence to sound principles of economy, the company was able to show an improvement during the same period. About the middle of July, however, definite, firm undertone in Canadian business began to make itself felt, so that the decrease in gross earnings has now been wiped out and an increase of approximately \$7,000,000 was shown at the end of the year. There has been no relaxation of the policy of careful watchfulness, however, and the Canadian National railways' net for the 12 months of 1925 should be the highest in the history of the company and an advance of \$13,000,000 over 1924."

"The excellent field crops undoubtedly helped the position, but should not be lost of the fact that a large measure of our favorable position is due to a really healthy growth in business in general in all parts of the dominion. Because the field crops play such an important part in dictating the trend of Canadian business, it would be inadvisable to go beyond the first six months of 1926 in venturing a prediction. Given an average crop, however, conditions during the first six months should be repeated with at least a natural betterment during the second half of the year, and I believe that the sound undertone which has made itself felt in Canadian business during the latter half of 1925, will continue to increase in strength during the first six months of the present year."

"These conditions will be reflected in the earnings of the steam transportation companies, which for some years, have been confronted by as difficult a task as has faced any industry in this country. Everything which has been accomplished during the past year has strengthened my faith in the future of Canada. Canada, I believe is on the threshold of much greater things than ever in her history."

WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 22.—In a special statement contributed to the annual agricultural and Commercial review of the Manitoba Free Press, E. W. Beattie, K. C., president of the Canadian Pacific railway says: "To my mind Canadian trade is in somewhat the position of a clock all wound up and ready to go awaiting only the touch that will start the pendulum swinging. The past year has seen much accomplished in the way of preparation for another period of well ordered and constructive progress. There has not been the expansion of general business it seemed reasonable to expect a year ago, but on the other hand there has been a stabilizing of basic conditions that hastened to form a solid foundation for future progress."

"The material wealth of the country has been greatly added by bountiful crops for which markets have been opened and important developments in mining and other of the country's basic industries. Foreign trade has shown a gratifying increase of which the pre-eminence of exports over imports is a reassuring feature and the steady development of the foreign tourist trade in practically all parts of this country has become an important factor in our economic progress."

"This Canadian conditions are basically sound and the need is for an acceleration of domestic trade and our manufacturing activities, in my opinion the best impetus to this end will be found in the successful prosecution of a vigorous immigration campaign. The time has come when Canada should be willing to spend a comparatively large sum of money in adding to the population enough new settlers to carry on the progress and development that was arrested when the war stopped immigration in 1914. I know of no more surely profitable investment that this country can make. These settlers must be chosen with due regard to their likelihood of early becoming producers and they must be aided in settling with every reasonable provision and assistance until they become established. The successful carrying out of such a policy as this, would in my opinion, lead toward a vivifying Canadian trade and industry and ensuring the expansion and development apparently justified by general conditions in this country."

Directions For Shipping Fox Skins to C. M. Lampson & Co. Per Parcel Post. Fox skins intended for C. M. Lampson & Co.'s, London Sales should be packed in parcels weighing not over 11 lbs., the outer covering of which should be of unbleached muslin or similar material; and the following address should be plainly marked on the outside of the package: C. M. LAMPSON & CO., 64 Queen Street, London, E. C. 4, England.

At the time the shipment is dispatched, an invoice must in every case be sent to Lampson & Co. and a duplicate to Alfred Fraser. This invoice should state: (1) The number of parcels sent forward. (2) The serial number marked on each parcel. (3) The quantity of skins in each parcel. (4) The value of each skin. (5) The amount of insurance required.

Great Discovery In Science Of Optics

WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 22.—By working in daylight where others have worked in darkness, Prof. Frank Allen, head of the department of Physics at the University of Manitoba, has made a discovery which is being received with acclamation by many scientists in Europe and America, and is said to mark a great advance in the science of optics.

For 250 years it has been customary to carry on optical experiments in a dark room. Being forced by circumstances to seek a new dark room in which to continue his experiments, Prof. Allen was led to question the utility of the dark room. "Why should I build a dark room when the modern spectrometer comprises in itself a dark room in miniature form?" he asked himself.

He determined to put his doubts to test and the very first experiment in daylight brought to light a hitherto undiscovered physiological reaction which he called "sensory reflex action."

The sensory reflex is an automatic balancing impulse which flows outward from the brain, and among other functions counteracts fatigue of the eyes. If, for instance, one looks through a tube with one eye at a strong red light, and measures the effect on the other eye, the measurement will show a greater intensity of color than if made directly. This surprising effect was entirely overlooked so long as experimenters worked in a dark room.

Hundreds of experiments have enabled Prof. Allen to make exact measurements of the effect of visual reflexes, to extend his theory to the realm of touch and taste, to reconcile previously conflicting theories of vision and to bring the scientific world a long step nearer to solving the ultimate mystery of perception.

Prof. Allen says his experiments prove that bright but not dazzling light does not tire the eyes as quickly as dim light. The discovery is of interest to physicians in that it opens up a new line of investigation as to nature and cause of color blindness. It promises to be of intense interest to psychologists. Also the new theory may afford a rational explanation of the doctrine of "creative thought."

Shipments by express should be made in exactly the same way as by parcel post, except that the packages need not weigh less than 11 lbs. It is not necessary so far as the insurance is concerned to declare any value to the express companies.

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Scientific men throughout the world have received the news of Prof. Allen's discovery with great interest. Sir John Parsons, president of the British Ophthalmic Association, declares that Prof. Allen's contribution to science has had the effect of unravelling the complex of color vision. Prof. Allen has been studying color vision for the past twenty years.

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AN Ottawa Church Incident

The Eastern Chronicle says:—The followers of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which is presumed, in some quarters, to have been obliterated, or swallowed up in the creation of the United Church of Canada (and much satisfaction over a State incident at Ottawa.

The great social event of Canada is "the drawing room" held by His Excellency, the Governor-General. They established the office referred to court precedence. It is in common parlance the utterance to Whose Who and how they rank.

When the invitations were issued this year, there was some what of a surprise created. The new order ran, The Lieutenant-Governor, the Prime Minister, Archbishops, Bishops, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Moderator of the United Church of Canada, Cabinet Ministers, the Chief Justice of Canada and a few others, along with their wives, unmarried daughters and unmarried sisters, had what is known as the Private Entree.

Senators, Members of the House of Commons and all lesser lights had a very much different reception. The point made is that the Moderator of the Presbyterian Church takes precedence immediately after Archbishops and Bishops and before the United Church dignitary. The representative of the Sovereign recognized the Presbyterian Church as next in line following the Episcopal and Roman Catholic Churches, taking precedence over the new United Church in Canada. Following the knowledge that such would be the order of precedence the Moderator of the United Church entered a vigorous and heated protest to Ottawa demanding that he, the Moderator of the United Church be accorded precedence over the Presbyterian Church Moderator and asserting that as that Church was absorbed in the United Church and ceased to be an organized Church, no heed was paid to Dr. Pilgerton's protest, as set out on demand, and Dr. Scott did take his place as Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, immediately after the High Church dignitary of the other two older Churches.

An Ottawa correspondent who writes as of the incident adds:—"In my judgment the Presbyterian Church of Pictou County and the Province generally should be enlightened as to the position accorded their Church as the oldest dissenting body of Church men in the Dominion, and incidentally approving and officially accepting our claim and right to the continued use of the old name and title of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Our long suffering people should be told of the recognition accorded."

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Hillsboro Bridge Closed to Highway Traffic

The Canadian National Railway intend replacing the ties on the Hillsboro Bridge. Consequently, on and after Monday, January 25th, the bridge will be closed to highway traffic until further notice.
