HOTEL WORK PROGRESSING—The foundation work of the Canadian National Hotel is moving rapidly towards completion. Mr. R. S. The extra work, not included in the contract of the building the footing and the column bases has been begun and will be completed in eight or ten days. The work is going on day and night with an average of fifty men working all the time. About 250 cubic yards of concrete is being used in the additional work. By the first of next week it is expected that it will be possible to start the erection of the steel frame. However his work will not begin for some time. The contract for the work has been awarded to the Canadian Vickers Company, Montreal.
