**SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES.**

The supplementary estimates submitted to the Commons the other day, although not quite so large as Mr. Tarte's organ had foreshadowed, are still framed on a somewhat lavish scale. The total appears to be \$5,497,393, of which nearly four millions is chargeable to capital account and the balance to income.

There is a sense of relief in finding that a quarter of a million is set down for the Murray Harbor Railway and the Hillsboro Bridge, the construction of which works in the near future may therefore be considered assured. There were some who believed or affected to believe that the federal and local ministers were wholly insincere in their professions in regard to these works. Such was never the opinion of THE GUARDIAN, and we are pleased to find our expectations realised.

It may be said that a quarter of a million is but a small beginning toward works which will cost a great deal more than that sum, but it is to be observed that the sum mentioned is to be voted for expenditure within the year ending 30th June next. Work cannot begin at once. Tenders must be called for, contracts made and other necessary preliminaries gone through with, so that the expenditure may be quite as large as could be judiciously made for these objects within the time specified.

In any case a quarter of a million now to be voted assures us that the bridge and railway will be undertaken and that the further sums necessary to complete them will be forthcoming in the future. This means that for some years to come there will be considerable outlay of Government money for public works in this vicinity. It means a large employment of labor, more money in circulation, and a proportionate betterment of trade and industry generally.

The large expenditure throughout the Dominion now proposed for the immediate future may probably mean a good deal more than what we have referred to. In fact it looks not unlike a preparation for a general election. It may be said that a dissolution can hardly be expected when the present parliament has but recently entered upon its fourth year. But it is to be remembered that the session about to close is the fourth of this series, and political leaders are very much accustomed to choose a time for elections when the occasion suits. At present trade is brisk, our industries flourishing and the treasury full to overflowing. Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues may therefore choose an early date for making an appeal to the people. This they may be the more likely to do if the Senate should reject the re-distribution bill, for Senate reform might in that case become a popular rallying cry in the campaign.

In any case we are glad to have the vote for the railway, the bridge and the piers and breakwaters that are provided for. Thanks are due to Sir Louis Davies and his associates for the interest they have taken in securing the appropriations referred to.

The new hotel project has impressed our citizens this year more than ever before for the plain reason that the want of the required accommodation was never so much felt. It is a question of going forward or lapsing backward. Either we must increase our hotel room or such steamships as the Grand Duchesse will no longer visit us. We believe the enterprise would be a paying one under good management; that it would be of pronounced benefit to the entire community, and is worthy of the best encouragement our City Council can offer.

Very shortly we are to have a red two cent stamp in place of the purple stamp which has hitherto done duty. No more red Canadian three cent stamps will be printed, but it is intimated that a limited number of them now in possession of the department may be issued at two cents each, and when these are used up the new red two cent stamp will be forthcoming.

Montreal had a small scare over the kissing bug which it was alleged had reached that city. Montreal Witness publishes a cut of the unlovely kissing insect, and quotes from the Brooklyn Eagle a statement that, as in the case of the mosquito, it is the female insect that is too lavish with its caresses, and that they are not dangerous. It appears also that the bug which alarmed the Montrealers was not the genuine "kisser."

One Mr. John Hague has written to the Montreal Herald a detailed account of his having been employed by the Tory government in 1882 to prepare the chart according to which Ontario was gerrymandered in that year. Mr. Hague is either a most notorious liar, or a truth-teller of a most remarkable sort. He seems to have the opinion that the gerrymander was a bad thing, which it was, but to have no compunctions of conscience for his own share in the transaction. Incidentally he complains that he was insufficiently paid for his great work. In fact his revelation leaves the impression that had the remuneration been sufficient the secret would not have been disclosed. Mr. Hague has waited seventeen years before making his revelation. Has he the hope that the Liberal party will pay him better for his disclosure than the Conservative party paid him for his chart?

**The Late William Woodside.**

One of the oldest, if not the oldest resident of Margate passed to eternal reward from his late residence on the 4th inst., aged 84 years, 10 mos. and 8 days. Mr. Woodside was born in Malpeque on Aug. 29th, 1813, and came to Margate with his parents when in his eleventh year where the whole of his subsequent life was spent. The subject of this sketch was in early life united in marriage to Miss Sarah Wood, of Lot 49. Some thirty-six years ago this union was dissolved by death and Mr. Woodside was afterward married to Miss Jane Adams of New London, who still lives to mourn her loss. The family consisted in all of eleven children, but one of whom belonged to the first marriage. Of these seven still survive, as follows. John A. Kensington; T. Samuel, Margate; J. Charles, Auburn, Me.; Benjamin L., Fr. Madison, Iowa; Lois B., Summerside; Moses S. Clinton, and Mrs. Wm. Minto, Summerside. In addition there are living twelve grand-children and ten great-grand children.

By his integrity and industry the deceased won a goodly heritage not only in worldly estate but in the greater riches of a good name, being well and widely known as a respectable and worthy citizen. For many years prior to his death he had been a devoted member of the Methodist church and in his earlier days took a leading part in its affairs. In January last a stroke of partial paralysis was suffered, followed by subsequent strokes, the third of which came on June 28th, which terminated fatally on the above date. The funeral was largely attended being conducted by the Rev. F. A. Wightman at the home, the church and the grave. "The memory of the just is blessed." Only two of the old inhabitants of Margate now remain, both of whom have passed the octogenarian age by some years.
