**WAR PRISONER HEARD FROM.**—The many friends of Mr. Fred J. Fraser, of this city, concerning whom there has been a good deal of anxiety for some time, will be glad to learn that his aunt, Mrs. (Dr.) Conroy, received a letter from him yesterday. Mr. Fraser is a prisoner of war in Germany and his letter, dated January 9th, is cheerful and optimistic. He has been receiving letters and parcels regularly from friends, although, for some unknown reason, his letters during the past two months failed to reach home, hence the anxiety of his friends. He is well, is in company with a number of "nice fellows," doubtless prisoners like himself, and is well treated by the Huns.

**MILITARY HOSPITAL.**—Yesterday afternoon the Connolly Building was formally handed over to the military authorities to be fitted up as a soldiers' hospital. It will be remembered that some weeks ago a Committee of citizens was appointed to look after the procuring of a suitable building for a hospital for the use of the soldiers. The committee consisted of Messrs. James Eaton, N. Hutton, R. H. Beer and Col. (Dr.) Jenkins. This committee succeeded in making satisfactory arrangements with the Connolly Estate with the result that this building was placed at their disposal. Yesterday the Committee met Col. Campbell and Lieut. Knight and formally handed the building over. Lieut. Knight announced that he had been instructed to proceed at once with the fitting up of the hospital and the work will be put in hand at once.

E. Island, 1914, Section 1, Chapter 2 specially provides for the issuing of debentures to the amount of \$15,000 for the purpose of constructing storm sewers in a portion or portions of the City.
